Seabreeze, Oct. 29.—The franchise presented by S. H. Gove for a trackless trolley system, with amendments one and two, on motion of C. F. Burgman, passed second reading at a special council meeting last Friday evening. The clause in regard to streets to be used reads as follows: From Duke street at intersection of Bath street at corporation line of Daytona Beach, northerly through Grandview to Ocean boulevard, westerly to Halifax avenue, thence southerly through Valley street to Duke street to corporation line of Daytona Beach, and through any other boulevard, avenue or street that the grantee or grantor may agree upon. The franchise will be taken up for final reading at the next regular monthly meeting the first Monday in November.

Material is on the ground for the erection of a five-room bungalow for Mrs. J. A. Coburn on her lot on Valley street adjoining C. P. Lund's property. L. Z. Burdick has the contract, and work will be pushed to a rapid completion.

A cement sidewalk being laid in front of the Colonnades grounds on Valley street and Ocean boulevard marks another big improvement for this popular hostelry.
