The Stage.

The famous old Irish drama, Kathleen Mavourneen, was played to a crowded house at the Eddy Opera house Thursday night with Miss Jennie James as Kathleen and Mr. Will H. Locke as Terrance. The part of Kathleen could not be improved by an amateur and in fact by few professionals. Miss James has a talent as an emotional actress. Her work in the second act, when the least error would cause the whole to fall flat, was exceptionally good, as was also the acting in the Black Crag scene. Miss James is especially favored in being able to assume the natural Irish character on account of a very good Irish dialect, seemingly more natural than acquired. Mr. Locke also used a good broad brogue evidently only acquired by years among the Irish people. His acting all through sustained his well earned reputation, especially in his singing and heavy work while in irons in the prison or farewell scene. As Billy Buttoneap, Arthur Draper brought down the house in every appearance. His make up and acting was impossible to excel. He has a talent which is difficult to find an equal. The deep bass voice of Hugh Freeman was admirably adapted to the part of David O'Connor and the make up was superb. Mr. Clyde Emerson made an excellent priest in Father O'Connell and a good Black Rhody, especially in the Black Crag scene when the struggle for the knife occurs. The least said about the dialect of the actors in these parts the better, especially Red Barney and Darby Doyle by Gus Stegman and Joe La Mee, both of whom were good with that exception. Miss Arba Allison and Mr. Will Nisbet as Kitty and Capt. Clearfield were well adapted to their parts and did the work with credit. Mr. John Emerson made an excellent Bernard Cavanagh, being able to look the villain without an apparent effort. Mrs. McCormick as Dorothy Cavanagh was highly applauded in the first act. Her appearance and manner was exceptionally good as the typical Irish lady of quality. Taken all together the play gave good satisfaction, all departing with the feeling they had been highly entertained. The scenery was all in place and proved to the public that Eddy has as fine an opera house as any in the territory. The next play to be put on by the Dramatic Club will be "Mixed Pickles," a roaring farce comedy which is guaranteed to keep the house in side splitting condition for two hours. The date for same will be announced later.
