## BIG SUM FOR STETSON SCHOOL.

How University May Get \$100,000 Present.

Board of Trustees Must First Re-

sign.—Founder's Offer.

The Stetson University trustees held a meeting in Deland a few days ago to take up the proposition of the late John B. Stetson, that if the present unanimous board would resign, he would give the university \$100,000, and which proposition Mrs. Stetson is willing to carry out. The proposition was made by Mr. Stetson two days before his death, according to the Deland Record.

Ex-Gov. Jennings introduced a resolution that the present trustees deed the university property to the State Baptist Association conditioned on the \$100,000, and then all resign. This resolution failed on a vote of 16 to 6 against such a procedure.

Then the regular proposition from Mr. Stetson was brought up and put to a vote. This required a unanimous vote, and it failed, 16 voting for it and 6 against it.

The trustees will meet again on April 9th, and there is a bare possibility that something can be done by which the school will get this \$100,000. Mrs. Stetson, however, knows what Mr. Stetson's feelings and intentions were, and will carry them out without change if possible.

There were five vacancies to be filled on the board. The vacancies were: Mr. Stetson, and Dr. Moore, deceased; and Messrs. W. S. McArthur, A. G. Hamlin and J. B. Law, resigned. These vacan-

cies were filled by the election of the following: S. V. Hough, S. A. Wood, J. B. Conrad, F. C. Edwards and E. L. Hon.

In addition to these five newly elected members the following other trustees were present: J. E. Oates, S. B. Wright, Dr. Hulley, D. U. Fletcher, W. S. Jennings, Chaplain Stewart, W. A. Hobson, H. B. Stevens, E. O. Painter and J. T. Clarke. Rev. Oates is acting chairman.

## GOOD WORK PROGRESSES.

Teams and Men Now at Work on Roads

North of Ormond.—"The Volusia

County Beach."

An Ormond gentleman in a personal letter to the editor speaks of the good roads which Volusia County possesses. He also speaks of the proposed hard road from Jacksonville to Miami. A league was recently formed in St. Augustine the object of which is to build a road along the eastern border of St. Johns county. The Hotel Ormond and people of the town of Ormond have already carried the road from this end almost to the St. Johns county line and have men and teams at work this week strengthening the weak line across the north end of the old Ormond Grant, now known as the Harwood Tract, from the crossing of Bulow Creek to the King's Road. The men and teams that were at work on the causeway had to be taken off after the heavy rains last fall.

Our correspondent goes on to say: "With the completion of the St. Augustine and Halifax Highway and the new Volusia County Highway from Daytona to Deland, the automobiles from St. Augustine by taking an early start, can run to Deland for dinner and return in the afternoon; or making an early trip run to Ormond or Daytona for dinner, thence to Deland for over night, returning the next day.

"The announcement that the dredges are only three miles apart is also interesting. The opening of a Motorboat Highway as well as a Motor Car Highway from St. Augustine to the Halifax will be of great importance to us all.

"With the west side of the county coming into the game, I can see where not only Ormond Beach, Ormond-Daytona Beach, Ormond-Daytona-Seabreeze Beach, but even Ormond-Daytona-Seabreeze-Daytona Beach will become Ormond-Daytona-Seabreeze-Daytona Beach-VOLUSIA COUNTY Beach."
