Coyote and Jack Rabbit.

To learn how to plod one must learn to love his work—the joy of doing. The pleasure is not in the completion, but in the planning and working—the planning to plod and the plodding.

And—

Do not forget the power of plodding is cumulative—that is to say, the more you plod the easier it becomes and the more it counts.

Edison, the brilliant inventor, is a plodder—no less. The successful man is always patient with routine.

Teach your boy to plod.

And point out to him that plodding is but another word for pluck.

The boy is impatient, impulsive. Plodding at his task is the only way he can steady himself. You owe it to your boy or girl to show how it may be done.

And the courage of it!

The plodder goes steadily on through bright and through cloudy weather, up and onward, though the way be narrow and full of thorns. The band does not play. The tumult and the shouting die, but the plodder plods on.
