Home-Raised Coffee. A GREAT THING FOR SOUTHERN FARMERS. Mr. P. H. Martin, of Madden, Laurens Co., is the agent for the seed of a little plant which promises to save our farmers millions of dollars. It produces a berry, that is very similar in all respects to coffee and can be easily raised in this climate. The headlight has received a sample from Martin, and it has the same aromatic odor, and produces as delicious a beverage as the imported article. The seed is put up in 25 and 50 cent packages, and each seed produces a plant from which a pint to a quart of coffee is gathered. It can be planted until June 20th, and matures in four months. Over 60 bushels have been produced from a single acre, and it can be raised for less than a cent per pound. The 50 cent packages will plant 200 hills.—Baptist Courier.
