German Advance Apparently Penetrates Great Distance Into Poland. London.-The veil of secrecy has been drawn over the battles between the Russians and the Austro-German forces. Headquarters of both armies confine themselves to briefest statements, saying merely that fighting

News from unofficial sources, however, shows the German advance has threatened for a second time. General von Hindeburg's army has advanced as far as the Lowicz-Skierniewice line.

The battle in East Prussia seems to have died down but the Russians continue to advance in Galicia and still are fighting on the Czenstochowa-Cracow front.

The battle in Poland in the direction of Lowicz is the most critical one and the Germans have the greatest confidence in the outcome but Petrograd military observers declare Russia's overwhelming superiority in numbers again must tell, as when the Germans made their first attack on Warsaw. In Flanders and in France the armies seem to be enjoying a longdeserved rest.

An eye-witness with British headquarters in a statement made public gives confirmation of heavy German losses at Ypres. He speaks of decimated battallions, of hundreds of dead left before the trenches and of batches of bodies found in farm houses. Casulty lists show that the British forces also have suffered.



Despite the severity of the weather in all sections of Europe and in Germans have persisted in their attacks on the allies, both to the east and west.

Gradually, however, they have been eaten back and have lost ground on both sides. On the Franco-Belgian frontier, the allies have driven them back across the Yser, and in the east they have been repulsed by the invading Russians, who now advise their war chiefs at Petrograd that they are vithing 189 miles of Berlin.

It has been a week of German adversities, but the Teutonic spirit is inlomitable and the kaiser's forces have shown the greatest contempt for death of Verdun.

The first check upon the various campaigns along the different battle was marked by the blizzards which swept down from western Poland the German empire and far into Belgium and northern France.


