THE FAREWELL MEETING.—The Farewell Meeting in the Associate Reformed Church on Wednesday night, in connection with the contemplated departure of Rev. Neill E. Pressly, missionary to Mexico, were well attended. The services were conducted by Rev. J. M. Todd, the pastor, and interesting addresses were delivered by the missionary, and by Revs. James Boyce, D. D., H. B. Pratt and Rev. Pressly the father of the missionary. The exercises were throughout solemn and impressive.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.
[FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]
NEWBERRY, S. C., December 12.—The ninety-third session of the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened at Newberry, December 11, 1878. Bishop Pierce, who was expected to preside, being absent on account of severe illness, Bishop Wightman is in the chair. I will give some points relating to the first and second days of the session:

After organizing, the Conference proceeded to the examination of ministerial character, under the question, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" This feature is peculiar to the Methodist Church in its various branches, and every clergyman, from the bishop down to the youngest minister, undergoes, before the proper body, this examination of character. In this work the Conference is now employed. Of its progress and close I will write again.

Let me mention something outside of the current of business. Rev. Samuel Leard preached the annual sermon before the Historical Society, tracing the history of this Conference and some of the fathers, from the organization in 1792 to 1800. In this—a most interesting discourse—this significant fact was brought out, viz.: that this Conference was organized in 1792, with ten ministers, and it now numbers two hundred and twenty ministers, with a membership, in

South Carolina alone, of about forty-two thousand.

The annual sermon before the under-graduates of the Conference was preached last night by Rev. H. M. Mood. It was a fine effort, replete with just such matter as was adapted to the important subject.

There is great sympathy manifested for our Chief Magistrate, Wade Hampton, and an hour of special prayer has been set apart in his behalf and also for the recovery of Bishop Pierce. More at another time. I write now in haste. A MEMBER.
