A School Tax .- The trustees of this school district have issued a call for a meeting to consider the question of a local tax, in accordance with an act passed by the Legislature. The act has not been published, but its provisions are about as follows: A school district shall be laid off four miles square, have the court-house as a centre, and having its sides respectively parallel with the corporate limits of the town. The county commissioners also erect this into a township for convenience in listing property. The law further provides that on the written request of three property-holders, the trustees each year, before June, shall, after one week's notice, call a meeting of those citizens who return real or personal property within the limits of the district. This meeting shall elect a chairman and secretary, and may levy a tax not exceeding a mill and a half, for school purposes. If a levy be made, notice of it must be given to the auditor, who shall assess it, and the treasurer shall

The difference between the new law and the old local tax law is that by tho former every voter had the right to vote. But as no extra tax can be levied on polls, the present law allows only those affected by the tax to vote on it. This bill attracted favorable attention in the Legislature, and a bill having the same provisions was introduced to apply to all towns, but was laid over till next session for want of time. We hope there will be a full turnout of all parties interested. The levy of such a tax affords the best means of insuring a good school.
