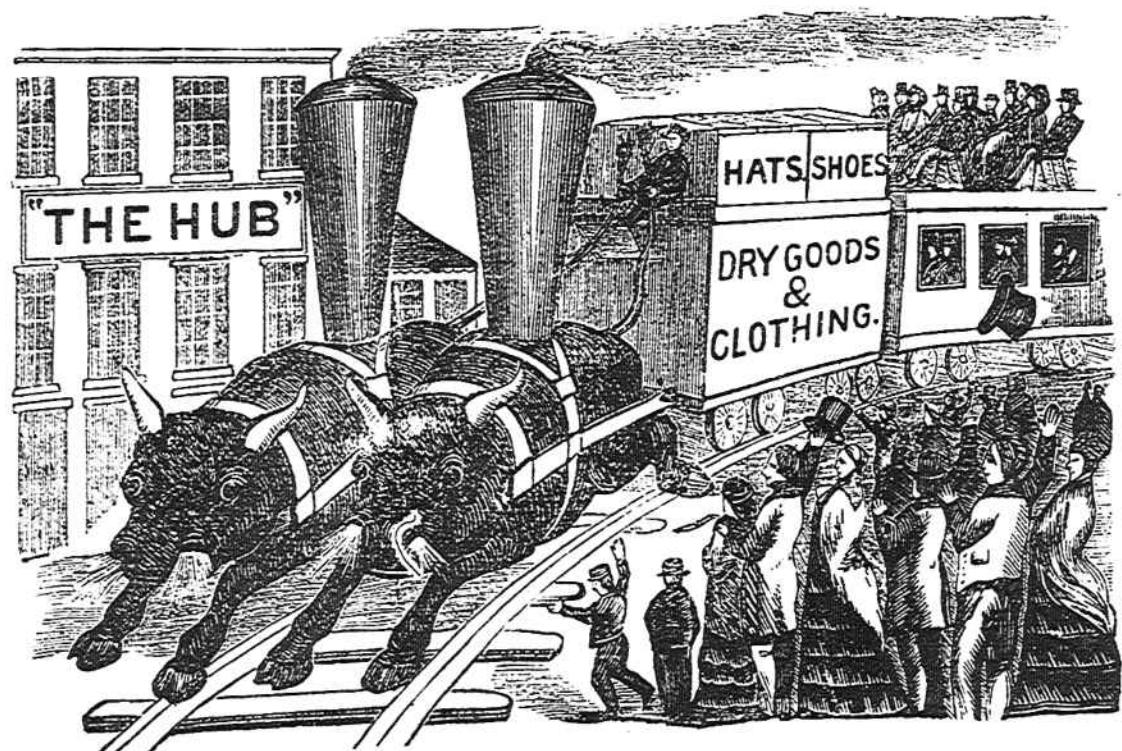

Supreme Court Decisions.

Mr. J. E. McDonald has had the good fortune of winning two cases in the Supreme Court at the last term. One was against S. K. McDonald and the other was over the delivery of a bale of cotton by Warren McMeekin, colored, to Mr. N. Timman.

The McDonald case raised a new point as regards advances. Mr. S. K. McDonald had borrowed a sum of money from his father before his death to pay a mortgage on his premises.

When he paid the mortgage, he decided the property to his wife. She then mortgaged the property to Mr. McDonald's father to secure the advance; but before his death he returned the mortgage to her as a gift. However, after his death a note was found in which the father claimed that Mr. S. K. McDonald owed him the sum loaned. The point raised was that the debt was settled by Mrs. McDonald giving the mortgage and that no debt existed against S. K. McDonald. The Court so decided.

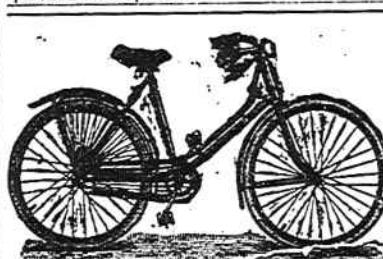
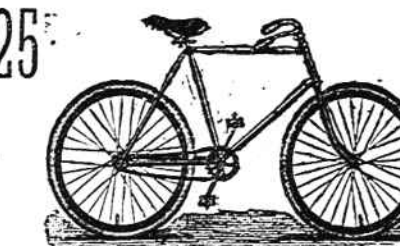
