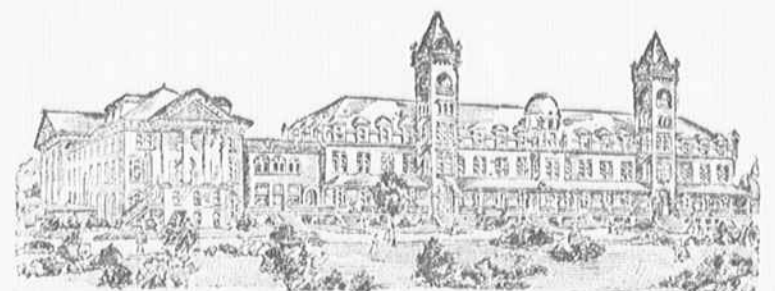
Miss Cleo Walker of the telephone office force went on the excursion to Atlanta Tuesday.
