Interesting Event to be Pulled Off Next Week. Large Crowds Expected. Greenwood, Oct. 27.—The official program and premium list of the Greenwood County Fair has just been announced and is highly pleasing to the interested public.

Wednesday will be Agricultural Day. The agricultural exhibits, which promise to be especially good will be judged on this day. The fair will open on Wednesday with a magnificent float parade.

Thursday will be Industrial Day and will be featured by the showing of "Made in Greenwood County" products. On Thursday will be seen a number of driving events, etc.

Friday is to be Educational Day, featured by a parade of school children and college students. In this parade will be fully 3,000 students, including the young ladies of Lander Female College, the young men of the Bailey Military Institute, the children of Connie Maxwell Orphanage and all of the school children of the town and county.

in a sham battle on the race track, which is expected to prove a "thriller." Military companies have been drilling and working hard in anticipating of the competitive drill and the sham battle, and some fine work is looked for tomorrow.

Will Witness Sham Battle. Governor Blease and staff, and Brig. Gen. Willie Jones and staff will attend the competitive drill and sham battle and review the military afterwards. This review will draw practically every spectator on the grounds, and coming in the afternoon will prove a fitting climax to the day's events.

The people are coming into Columbia by every train, and Main street was lively tonight with the holiday crowd. A throng of pleasure seekers paraded the extent of the "Great White Way" until near the midnight hour and the spirit of enjoyment was uppermost.

More visitors are expected tomorrow. Beginning early tomorrow morning the crowds are looked for in increasing numbers until Thursday, when the climax from the attendance standpoint is usually reached. Hotels and boarding houses are filling rapidly, but every one can be provided for. The bureau of information, in the City Hall, in charge of Clerk G. Flavie Cooper, is looking after everyone's wants.
