Clintonscales to define compulsory education. "What length of term?" he asked. "Three months," replied Mr. Clintonscales. Mr. Manning also wanted to know of Mr. Clintonscales how many children he would have to school, and how to raise money necessary for compulsory education.

He said he wanted to get down to the basis and to see whether or not it is practicable. Mr. Manning advocated State aid for weak school districts, to make minimum school term seven months and not over fifty pupils to one teacher, and state to pay half of cost of building school houses. He advocated county local option compulsory education.

Mr. Manning promised, if elected, a fair and impartial enforcement of the law and conservative use of the pardoning power and to be governor of all the people. He was given flowers. —News and Courier.

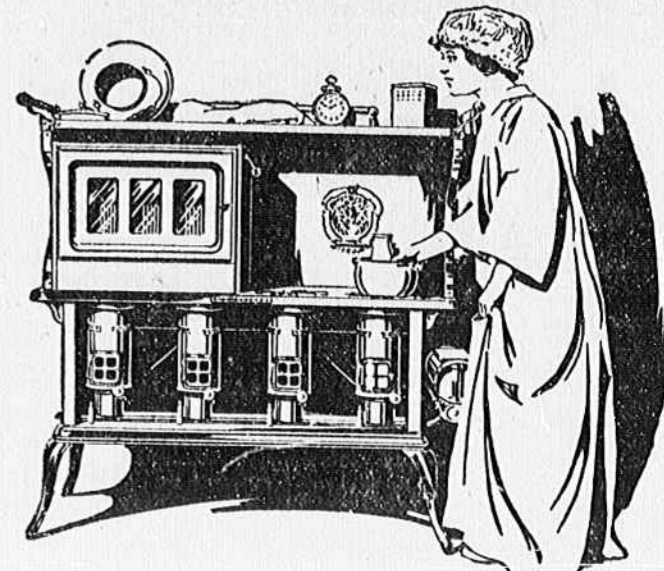

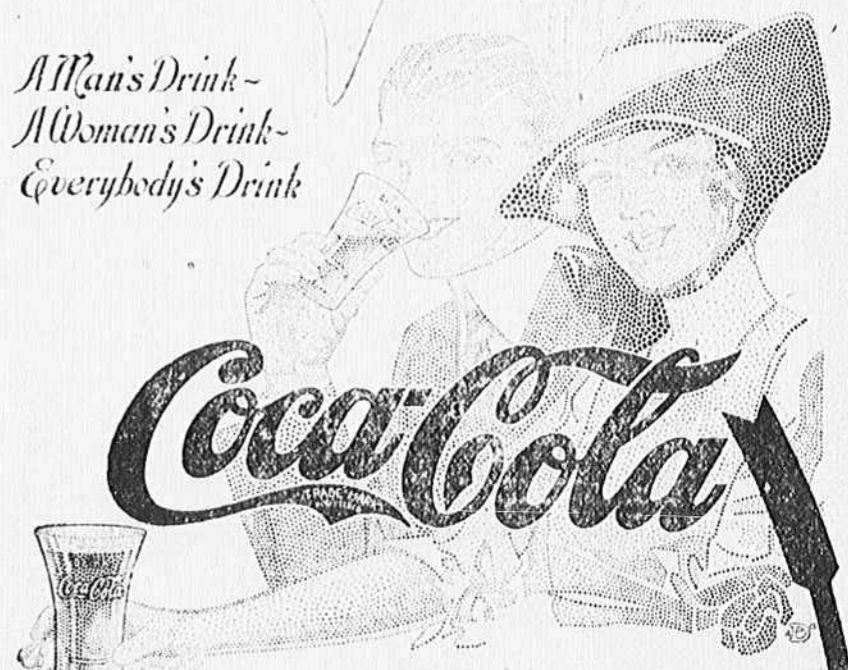
