WATTS MILLS ENCOURAGES GARDENING AND FLOWERS

Has Employed Demonstrator to Supervise Gardening and Yard Beautifying in Mill Village.

To make the Watts Mills village one of the most beautiful in the state and its gardens the most productive is the goal set by Mr. Harold C. Smith, agent and general manager of the mill, judging from the plans already made in this direction. To that end the company has employed a Clemson graduate, Mr. W. H. Garrison, to give three days of each week to assisting and advising with the mill villagers in cultivating flowers and vegetables. After sufficient time elapses Mr. Smith expects to see every front yard in the village made into a flower garden and every garden highly productive in vegetables. Of course a large number of yards and gardens are already cultivated to a high state of efficiency, but it is expected that the work of Mr. Garrison will give such an impetus to such work that the village will see almost a transformation. Mr. Garrison will also give his attention to the general plan of beautifying the streets and mill grounds. The mill company expects to go to considerable expense in order that its operatives may enjoy the beauties of nature as well as secure the more substantial benefits of home gardening. This is in line with the management's policy of co-operating with its employees to the mutual benefit of both.

Mr. Garrison is a graduate of Clemson College and has been in demonstration and experimental work during most of the time since graduation.

INSTRUCTIONS

For Those Who Secure Signatures to Hoover Pledge Cards, for Conservation of Food and Registration Cards.

First. Try to get the Chamber of Commerce or your county paper to donate such a number of Hoover cards as will be necessary for the white and colored women of your county.

Second. This is a request from your President of the United States.

Third. Be courteous and friendly. Avoid controversies. Make it your business to reach every woman and every cook who has charge of a household in the section assigned you, also every restaurant and hotel keeper, and chef.

Fourth. The county should be subdivided into townships with a chairman in each township and let her in turn select her township committee, who could either collect their women at the churches and school houses in each township, or make a house to house canvass, whichever method in their judgment seems best.

Fifth. Cities should be divided into wards, precincts and blocks, and placed in charge of captains, and each group of women given a certain number of blocks.

Sixth. Women should go out in twos in canvassing homes.

Seventh. Have plenty of women so that the work may be done quickly. Before sending them out get them all together and explain why we are asked to sign these cards, and to what it will lead.

Eighth. In the country, automobiles should be provided by patriotic men and each section definitely assigned to some group of two women.

Ninth. Remember this is a most important task in which you have the privilege of assisting. South Carolina must make a good showing in pledging its women for the conservation of foods.

Tenth. In getting women to sign the registration cards make a brief explanation in each case that the country needs the services of women during the war just as much as the services of men, and that patriotic women must be willing to do whatever they can to help their government.

Eleventh. Push the signing as rapidly as possible when once it is begun.

Twelfth. Work should begin at once, as soon as your county is thoroughly organized and ready to go ahead.

Thirteenth. Have the cards signed in your presence and bring them to the chairman of your Women's Committee, who will turn them over to the chairman of the County Council of Defense.

Fourteenth. The chairman of the county council will then express the county council to Herbert Hoover, Food Administrator, Washington, D. C.

Fifteenth. The registration cards shall be turned over to the chairman of each county and retained by her at the county seat. Summary copies in duplicate shall be sent to Mrs. J. L. Visanska, State Registrar, Charleston, S. C., who keeps one summary and sends the other to the National headquarters of the Woman's Committee, 1814 N. St., N. W., Washington, D. C., so that if the services of the women registered in different departments are

needed by the government, they will know definitely where to find those qualified for service. Of course this service is voluntary, not compulsory. Mrs. F. Louise Mayes, Chairman, S. C. Div., Woman's Council of Defense

AMERICANS TREAT FRENCH TO PICNIC

"Sammy's" Gladly Their Instructors with White Bread and Fried Chicken. Marines Dress in Khaki.

American Training Camp in France, Aug. 9.—Taking advantage of a half holiday on Wednesday afternoon, one of the American regiments training in France, entertained its French instructors at a field luncheon or picnic in one of the most ruggedly picturesque spots in the entire American army area. The American officers entertained the French officers and the American enlisted men their comrades in the French ranks.

The men all shared alike in being helped from the big field kitchen. They sat on the grass, ate together and carried on a lively conversation, despite the difference in tongue. There were many good things to eat cooked in American fashion, but the French soldiers seemed to enjoy most of all the white bread served from the American field bakeries.

The French officers were given a particular treat by the way of fried chicken, country style. The afternoon was a great success and marked a still closer unity between the American and French armies. When the luncheon was at its height one French officer enthusiastically exclaimed: "Oh, if the boys could only see us now."

The American soldiers have a half-holiday each Wednesday. This is in lieu of a half-holiday on Saturday, for it has been found that Saturday noon to Monday mornings too long an interval to be away from work.

The marines are somewhat dejected over the order that they must adopt khaki instead of their most distinctive uniform of forest green. The latter looks extremely like the German field gray uniform, and after being in service a little while, but the real reason for the change unquestionably is the desire to simplify the equipment of the expeditionary forces and to make all the equipment interchangeable.

Arrangements have been made whereby the French Government has agreed to sell to the Americans a number of trained artillery horses and pack mules as transport animals. The French has an excess supply of these just now and the arrangements will be a great boost to the Americans who will get animals already seasoned in actual war work.

Sweet Potatoes for Soldiers.

Columbia, Aug. 9.—Sweet potatoes have been officially made a part of the army diet, according to a telegram received here today by Commissioner E. J. Watson, of the State Department of Agriculture. Col. Watson for some weeks has pressed on the War Department the claims of the sweet potato as an article of diet. Failing in his efforts to get it included in soldiers' rations, Mr. Watson, as president of the National Association of Commissioners of Agriculture, had called a meeting of the members from sweet potato growing states at Washington on the 20th of this month. In view of the decision of the War Department, this meeting was today cancelled by President Watson.
