BRITISH KNIGHT COMING HERE

John Foster Fraser, F. R. G. S. on Redpath Chautauqua Program.

GREAT WAR LECTURE

"The Checkerboard of Europe" Is Topic to Be Discussed by Famous British Journalist and Traveler.

Sir John Foster Fraser, F. R. G. S., chairman of the National War Lectures committee of Great Britain and England's most famous newspaper special correspondent, is to lecture on this year's Chautauqua program.

He has been with the British army in France and Flanders, with the British grand fleet, has seen Russia under war conditions, and has traversed the whole of the mountainous region of the Balkans. By the special permission of the British prime minister, Mr. Lloyd-George, he has visited the principal government munition works in England and Scotland.

Sir John, who is a native of Edinburgh, Scotland, has done more varied

travelling than any man alive, having been in nearly half a hundred different countries.

Sir John has described his wanderings in a dozen books. He has long been famous in Great Britain as a speaker with a personality. Indeed as the London Press says, "He is as brilliant on the platform as he is with his pen."

When the war began in 1914 his unique knowledge of foreign lands was placed at the service of his country. These have been publicly acknowledged by the British government. In June, 1917, the honor of knighthood was conferred upon him by King George at Buckingham palace.

The subject of his lecture will be: "The Checkerboard of Europe."

Efficiency in the home means food and time saved, food for our allies and our armies overseas, time for Red Cross and other similar work here. BEARD DECIDES TO SERVE SENTENCE

Withdraws Appeal and was Taken to Atlanta Yesterday to Serve One Year. Convicted in November of Disloyal Utterances.

Greenville, May 14.—W. P. Beard, of Abbeville, who was convicted last November in the Federal court of violation of the espionage law and sentenced to one year and a day in the Federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., and to pay a fine of \$50, but who has been liberty, on bond pending an appeal, yesterday withdrew his appeal and left in the afternoon in the custody of a Federal officer for the penitentiary to commence serving his sentence.

New charges of disloyal utterances were brought against Beard Saturday, and he was arrested on a Federal warrant Sunday at his home at Abbeville and brought to this city. After conferences Sunday night and yesterday morning with government officials, the prisoner announced he had decided not to fight the first charges longer and was ready to begin serving his sentence.

The offense for which Beard was convicted was the publication of an article entitled "The Great Fizzle" in The Scimitar, a weekly publication of which Beard was editor and publisher. The publication was barred from the mails as the result of the appearance

of this article. It is understood here that the latest charges against the prisoner may be withdrawn.
