### CONGRESS LIKELY

#### TO REMAIN ON JOB

Leaders Balk on President's Special Session Proposal. Democrats Blame G. O. P.

Washington, May 25.—Prospects for a postponement of revenue legislation and an early adjournment of Congress again appeared to have vanished tonight when Democratic and Republican leaders in Congress failed to agree on a program presented by President Wilson for a special session after the November elections.

The Republicans, according to administration spokesmen, blocked the proposal by refusing to give assurances that a bill along lines proposed by the President would be passed within a definite time. Tonight Democratic leaders prepared to go ahead with the framing of a bill.

The revenue situation has been considerably muddled for several days. At one time yesterday it appeared certain Congress would go ahead with the legislation before adjournment at the insistence of Secretary McAdoo, but the President evolved the plan for an extra session and up until late today it appeared as though it would be put through.

Unable to reach an agreement among themselves, Senate leaders tonight said it appeared virtually certain they would have to proceed immediately with the legislation. Conferences between administration leaders were held in anticipation of beginning work soon on the bill.

That Congress will be in session all summer if the revenue bill is gone into was the belief tonight of some leaders.

So certain was Senator Simmons of the situation that he cancelled an engagement he had asked with President Wilson to submit the proposed congressional agreement which failed to materialize.

Two meetings of the finance committee were held today in an effort to agree on a proposal meeting the President's conditions.

### EFFECTIVENESS OF U-BOAT DWINDLES

French Minister of Marines Gives Convincing Figures of Allied Success. May Record Month for Destroying U-Boats.

Paris, May 26.—As proof that the Allies are rapidly overcoming the submarine menace, George Leygues, the minister of marine, informed the army and navy war committees of the Senate yesterday that Great Britain and the United States alone had constructed in April 40,000 tons more shipping than was sunk by the enemy.

The minister declared also that the means employed to rid the seas of submarines had become increasingly effective since January and had given decisive results.

The minister pointed out the tremendous strides recently made by the Allies in repairing ships damaged by torpedoes or mines and declared that coordination between the Allied nations had become so smooth during the last four months that the tonnage restored to the sea exceeded 500,000 tons weekly. Great Britain, he said, had repaired 185,000 tons in one week recently while France had effected repairs upon 200,000 tons in one month. The increased building and more efficient and speedier repair work was constantly bringing better results in the transport of troops and supplies.

As to the increasing destruction of submarines, the minister said the figures for April were excellent, showing an increase over the preceding months but were far surpassed by the results known to have been attained thus far in May. Jacques Dumont, under-secretary of aeronautics, announced to the committee that the program for the construction of naval machines prepared in 1917 had already been equalled in 1918, but that a new and more intensive effort was planned.
