TRAIN HELD UP

BY FOUR BANDITS

Nashville, Aug. 21.-With railroad and postoffice detectives scouring middle Tennessee and following every indication of a clue late this afternoon, the four bandits who held up and robbed the Louisville and Nashville passenger train No. 7, ten miles south of Columbia, last night, were still at large. One clue was based on the report that a woman and two men were seen driving in an automobile near the scene of the robbery late last night coupled with the mysterious appearance here two days ago of a woman who claimed to be from a Western State and had a ticket for Glendale, the station near which the robbery oc


