THE STATE FAIR.

The weather this year was against the Fair. The week started out clear and pretty, but the rains on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday kept hundreds of people away from Columbia who would have been there. The exhibits we thought were far from what they should have been. We notice that the members of the association remarked on this subject at their meeting on Thursday and efforts are to be made to increase the premiums so as to induce our people to send exhibits. The trouble with the association is to get the money with which to pay the premiums. A year like this with the rainy weather very much interferes with the receipts.

The crowd on Thursday was very large even though it was rainy and damp.

We are always glad to go down and spend a day. Our purpose is not to see the exhibits, but to meet and mingle with people we see only occasionally, and in fact only on these occasions.

Politicians were there from all parts of the State and the candidates for various positions at the disposal of the Legislature were in evidence and were shaking hands with the members and seeking their votes. Altogether it was a pleasant trip to us. We had the boys with us and they seemed to enjoy it and on their account we were glad we went.

The boys should be given an opportunity to see something and to get away from home occasionally. It does them good. In fact we are a believer in older boys going away from home occasionally so as to see what other people are doing and to hear what they are talking about. It broadens the vision and makes one more liberal in his views. It takes us out of our shell and makes us less selfish.

The management of the Fair had fitted up a nice room at the left of the entrance where a great many of the exhibitors were present, called and were made comfortable. We were glad to see and talk with so many of the exhibitors. They are beginning already to talk about the next annual meeting and the trip we shall arrange.

And that reminds us that Mr. J. T. Harris, of the Harris Lithia Springs, was present at the Fair with a very fine exhibit of his health giving waters and many glasses were served to the large crowds who passed to and fro, and Mr. Harris said he wanted the next meeting of the exhibitors which is to be at his springs to be the best meeting ever held and that he proposed to spare no pains or money to make it such. We have no doubt he will succeed.

The fire works and the battle of Manila were very good. The movements of the ships, the firing of the guns and the forts and the sinking and burning of the battleships of the Spanish were all very realistic.

The present officers of the Fair Association were re-elected. We hope renewed interest in these annual fairs may be aroused and that the people will see to it that these annual gatherings may be kept up.

The first issue of Vol. 2 of the Stylus, published by Newberry College, has been sent out. Prof. E. B. Stetler is editor from the faculty and Prof. S. J. Derrick is business manager. The Executive Society is represented by W. H. Miley and G. W. St. Clair; the Philanthropic Society by W. A. Rast and H. K. Boyd; and the Philomathean by Miss Annie Mariat Riser. This number contains 22 pages of good solid matter and reflects credit upon the editors and the college. The price is only 50 cents a year. The Stylus was printed at the college fourteen years ago and then was discontinued after one year. Since then the Collegian has been issued, but it was decided to revive the old Stylus and number from it. We hope the enterprise will be a success.

The presidents of all the colleges in the State have joined with a committee from Charleston in securing a charter for the purpose of organizing a company for the publication of the poetry of Timrod, the purpose of publishing and selling being to put up a public memorial of the poet. Among the number is President Cromer. In writing the committee he says: "I am heartily in sympathy with the movement, and I shall gladly do what I can to promote its success."

There will be no doubt of the success of this movement to print and publish the poems of Timrod. It should receive the encouragement of every man in the State and the poems will no doubt have a large sale.

In reply to our Prosperity correspondence we would say that "William Barrett Travis was born in Edgfield District, S. C., August 9, 1809, within four miles of Red Bank church." He was the son of Mark Travis, Sr. In 1818 the family moved to Alabama. W. B. Travis was well educated and studied law. In 1835 he moved to Texas. For full particulars see Chapman's history of Edgfield.

Another day will have to be set aside as Arbor Day for this year if any trees or flowers are to be planted around the school houses, for last Friday was rather rainy. It is a good idea to have a day for planting trees and flowers around the school house. These things help to make the schools pleasant and attractive.

It is sometimes more difficult to know what to keep out of a newspaper than it is to find things to put in it.
