The Dollar Democracy campaign has the backing of all party leaders in the state. The plan is to secure as much as One Dollar from every voter.

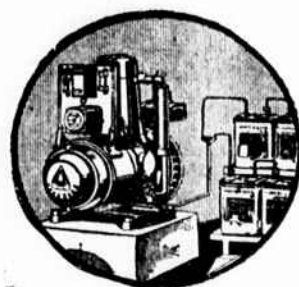

## STRINGENT RULES

**HOGS AND CATTLE MUST BE  
FREE FROM DISEASE BEFORE  
BEING EXHIBITED**

Law Requires That Swine And Cattle  
Must Have Certificate of Health  
Or They Cannot Be Shown  
At Fairs

The recently enacted law regarding the exhibition of cattle and hogs at county fairs and other places within the State of South Carolina became effective August 1 and will, therefore, affect the exhibits at the coming fair in this county.

The regulations that will govern the exhibition of hogs reads as follows:

"No swine shall be shipped or moved in any manner, into or within the State of South Carolina for exhibition at any fair or live stock show, unless they are free from symptoms of any contagious, infectious or communicable disease, and must have been protected against cholera by the 'simultaneous inoculation' method not less than three weeks prior to shipment or movement, or by the 'serum alone' method not more than two weeks prior to shipment or movement.

"Shippers will be required to file with the Clemson College Live Stock Sanitary Office, Columbia, an affidavit, giving the number of hogs, breed, name, registration, number and age of each animal; also the date and by whom treated with the 'simultaneous inoculation' or 'serum alone' method, not less than one week prior to the shipment or movement of such hogs. The Clemson College Live Stock Sanitary Office will then issue a permit which shall accompany the hogs to destination.

"All hogs intended for exhibition must be disinfected in a two per cent. Cresol Compound, U. S. P., or some other standard recognized disinfectant, at the time of shipment or movement. All crates must likewise be disinfected. Clean and disinfected cars or other vehicles only shall be used in the movement of swine.

"No person, firm or corporation shall offer for shipment, nor shall any transportation company accept for shipment swine intended for exhibition at any fair or live stock show within the State of South Carolina except in accordance with the preceding requirements."

In regard to cattle the law says:

"No cattle shall be shipped or moved in any manner, into or within the State of South Carolina, for exhibition at any fair or live stock show, unless they are accompanied by a health certificate and tuberculin test card, issued by a qualified graduate veterinarian, certified by the State Veterinarian of the State where the shipment originates and approved by the Chief of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry for Interstate tuberculin testing, or by a veterinarian in the employment of the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, showing freedom from disease.

"The tuberculin test must be made made not more than sixty days prior to shipment, or movement, unless the cattle are from an accredited herd or a herd in the process of accreditation, under State and Federal Supervision. Each animal must be described sufficiently for identification stating breed, age, weight, color, marks or name and number if registered.

"The tuberculin test card must be in triplicate, the original and triplicate to be forwarded to the Clemson College Live Stock Sanitary Office and the duplicate shall accompany the cattle to destination."

"The same regulations as to clean cars, or other vehicles applies to cattle and hogs."

### TEAL'S MILL DAM WASHED OUT

The recent heavy rains caused Teal's dam to give way. The break is a serious one and there is no possibility that it will be mended. The Teal Light and Power Company is furnishing light from the plant, but the power is furnished by an engine.

This is the second break in the dam within two years and Dr. Teal has announced that he will not undertake to repair the plant on his own responsibility. He also declares that he will not continue the service for any length of time under present conditions.

There is a movement on foot to consolidate the Light and Power Company with the Chesterfield Telephone Company. It is proposed to form a stock company with sufficient capital to put both concerns in condition for giving first class service. Both Dr. Teal and Capt. Welsh, owner of the Telephone Company, are interested in the new proposition and both will take stock.

This movement had been on foot for some time prior to the recent break in the dam. Dr. Teal has often said of late that the responsibility of the sole management was too much for one man and that he would either have to shift the burden or give up his practice. He prefers to continue his practice.

Just what headway has been made in the reorganization, plan is not known, but Dr. Teal states emphatically that unless it is consummated within a short time he will abandon the plant, drain off the pond and sell machinery, wiring and other extensive equipment to the highest bidder. If this comes to pass Chesterfield bids fair to return to coal oil for illuminating purposes, at least for a time.

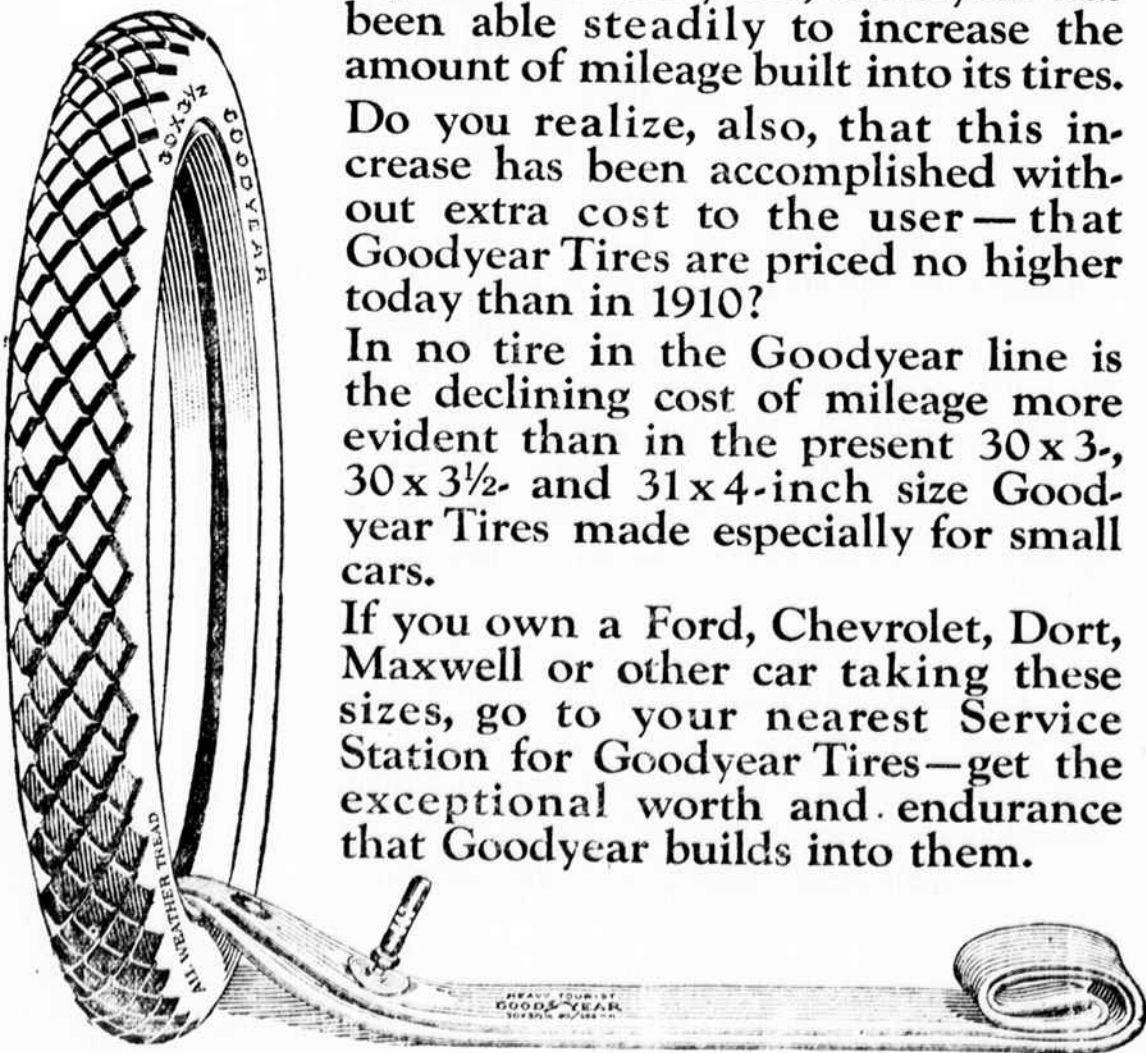
