COLLIDE IN LIVERPOOL HARBOR.

Three Steamers Involved in a Singular Series of Accidents.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 18.—A singular series of accidents occurred in the Mersey today. The Norwegian steamer Veritas collided with the Leyland line steamer Devon from Boston, October 1. Unsuccessful efforts were made to beach the Veritas on the Cheshire shore, after which she was towed over to the Liverpool side, where the cable parted and she collided with the steamer Earl of Powys, causing the latter to break from her moorings.

Thereupon both steamers drifted down the river, and the Veritas crashed into two thick iron booms stretched from the pier head at St. George's Landing stage. Everything above her deck was carried away, and she is now a submerged wreck.

The Earl of Powys, while drifting, smashed her bows, lost her propeller and her crew leaped upon the dock wall. The south end of the landing stage was extensively damaged.

The aggregate damage done will amount to thousands of pounds.

YOUNG CROKER WINS RENOWN.

Gains Attention at Cornell on Account of His Dogs.

ITHACA, N. Y., Oct. 18.—Richard Croker, Jr., son of the famous Tammany boss and politician, who is now a member of the freshman law class at Cornell, has received great attention since he first came to Ithaca. Today more than ever he drew all eyes toward him. Six of his famous English bulldogs, whose value aggregates nearly \$15,000, were brought to town.

"Kipling," for which \$4,000 was paid, was the subject of special attention. He was led through the streets, which were for a time blocked with crowds who gathered, not so much to see a dog as to get a glimpse of \$4,000.
