Fernando Maldonado, president of the Maldonado Commercial company, is lying ill with fever in the City of Mexico.

C. H. Jones, of Springfield, Ill., passed through Florence Thursday on his way to Mineral Creek, where he is interested in mines.

Bo. Whitesides, well known in this county, where he lived for several years, has been appointed under sheriff of Santa Cruz county.

It is reported that Elwood Hadley, Indian agent at Sacaton, has been called to Washington on matters pertaining to the building of the San Carlos dam.

The principal attraction of the Phoenix carnival was a female muscle dancer known as "Little Egypt," who was arrested for indecent exposure and placed under \$25 cash bond, which was forfeited.

N. H. Mellor, who recently struck coal four miles east of Dudleyville, has sunk a shaft fifteen feet on the deposit, which is opening up splendidly. This is thought to be the most important strike of recent years.

Quite an excitement was kicked up this week by the reported loss of money going through the mail, but the cash turned up all right, and there proved to be no foundation for the furor. People are sometimes a little previous in making accusations.

Hinson Thomas will be under sheriff of Gila county after the first of the year, and will give up his position with the Old Dominion Commercial company, so it is said. Mr. Thomas understands the duties of the office thoroughly, having filled it satisfactorily in this county several years ago under Ex-sheriffs Fryer and Drais.

The 20th Century Club met Thursday evening at the parsonage and had Shakespeare's "Hamlet" under discussion, with Mrs. C. D. Reppy as leader. It proved to be an interesting occasion and was greatly enjoyed by all who attended. The next meeting will be a "Lowell" night, with Mrs. W. W. Wilson as leader and Mrs. L. K. Drais as hostess.

Next Monday evening will be Christmas Eve. The occasion will be observed by both the Presbyterian and Catholic societies of our town, the former at the church and the latter at the Court-house. The programme in each case will be of a religious character appropriate to the birth of our Savior, and no doubt will be equally interesting. At the Court-house an admission fee of 25 cents will be charged, with 25 cents additional for reserved seats, proceeds to be devoted to the church building fund. The entertainment at the Presbyterian church will be in charge of the Sunday-school; admission free.

Charley Hardy, Walter Bailey, Petronello Avenente, Harvey Elliott and Dan Bugh were out in the Superstitions this week after mountain sheep and antelope. Learning that there was a penalty for killing sheep, they refrained from violating the law, and satisfied themselves with one coyote, one jack rabbit, one cottontail and one quail. Several dozen shots were fired at antelope, however, but no meat was brought in.

A. J. O'Connor, who for the past two terms has successfully taught the Kenilworth school, has received the appointment of principal of the Nogales public school, and will take charge of the same after the 1st of January. His brother, Will O'Connor, was formerly principal of the Nogales schools, but was elected Probate Judge of the county at the November election, thus creating a vacancy.

DIED—In Tucson, December 20, 1900, C. H. Niemeyer, aged 84 years. Deceased was father of the postmaster of Florence, C. H. Niemeyer, Jr., who left yesterday noon for Tucson to attend the funeral. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to the bereaved family.

During the year 1900, Assessor M. M. Hickey has collected and turned into the county treasury \$6,078.50, from the following sources: Poll taxes, \$1,949.50; personal property taxes, \$4,129.00. This is a very creditable showing, and proves Mr. Hickey to be a vigilant officer.
