## TERRITORY NEWS.

The Salt river valley has had an extraordinary heavy flood, which has been worth thousands of dollars to ranchmen in the valley.

It has been announced that the California limited trains will be run daily on the Santa Fe during the winter. The daily service will commence about December 1.

Work is to be commenced immediately on an arch for the Williams tunnel. The bouches will be twelve feet with a 9 foot arch. The work will probably require a year.

Mr. J. W. Flemming, territorial mine inspector for the last six years, has resigned his position. Mr. Fleming was appointed by President Cleveland and on the election of McKinley sent in his resignation, but it was not accepted.

A most singular accident happened to the little boy of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson of Phoenix last week. While playing in the streets the little fellow was fatally bitten by a scorpion. It is the only death ever recorded in Arizona from a scorpion bite.

It is said the Mormon expedition headed by Benjamin Cluff, a young professor, was compelled to break up at Nogales, having run against an entanglement at the customs house which resulted in financial disaster. Nine members of the party will go on south and fifteen will return to Provo, Utah. The party found that the Mexican customs laws imposed a tax of \$1,500 on their outfit and in order to get through the line they were forced to sell twenty horses to raise the money necessary to get through with the balance of the horses and outfit.

A railroad business boom is on in Arizona, caused by the growth of the mining business in the territory, says the Phoenix Gazette. Besides the Morenci & Southern and the Bisbee & Nacossari, which are now under construction, there is railroad talk in nearly every section of the territory. One of the most important moves in the railroad business in the territory is the converting of the narrow gauge road between Clifton and Lordsburg, a distance of seventy-two miles, into a standard gauge, thereby greatly increasing the capacity of the road and bringing it into a condition to meet the growing shipments of ore.

Notice to Voters.

Notice is hereby given, that at a regular meeting of the board of supervisors of Navajo county, Arizona, held at their office on the 2nd day of April, 1900, it was ordered that a re-registration of all the voters of Navajo county, Arizona, be made. Register closes October 15, 1900.

Act No. 37, twentieth legislative assembly: Sec. 1. "No recorder, justice of the peace, or other officer authorized to register electors in any of the counties of the territory of Arizona, shall register or take the affidavit for the purpose of re-registration of any elector within this territory, unless such person desiring to be registered shall produce and exhibit to the registering officer a receipt showing that he has paid a poll tax for the year in which he is registering."

Sec. 2. "This act shall not apply to any person who is by law exempt from the payment of a poll tax. But in this event the person desiring to register must make affidavit to the facts that entitle him under the law to an exemption from the payment of a poll tax."

Sec. 3. "Any of the registering officers enumerated in section 1 of this act, or any that may hereafter be qualified to register electors, who enters the name of any person upon the great register of the county in which he is an officer, without requiring the person seeking to be registered to exhibit a poll tax for the year in which he is being registered, or taking the affidavit of such person showing that he has paid a poll tax, shall be guilty of misdemeanor and subject to fine, upon conviction thereof, of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not less than thirty days nor more than sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment."

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Navajo County, Arizona Territory.  
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
