THE Illinois Republicans in convention assembled, struck the key note of Americanism in their tariff declaration. It was as follows: "We believe in the protection of American labor, and denounce as unwise and unpatriotic the attempt to embody in our national legislation the principles of free trade. Intelligent and prosperous free labor is the cornerstone on which our free government is founded and we protest against its being impoverished by competition with the productions of the underpaid labor of the old world, or degraded by the importation of heathen or pauper labor from China or any other portion of the world."

IN our issue of Monday, we tried in an article entitled, "Monk and Morrison," to point out to the people of this county that the bogus "cow boy" letter from Wilcox on the same subject, published in the Democrat of Saturday, was really written by Wm. C. Monk, brother of E. R. Monk, Democratic candidate for County Judge. That this Wm. C. was the only Monk who resided in this county at any time before the last county election, and that he had gilded up various cattle ranches in his own name and that of his now candidate brother, who was then shyster in a St. Louis police court; and that this candidate Monk was not long enough in this Territory to have a vote at the time of his nomination. All this the Democrat neither answers nor denies. It can not do so, because they are matters of record in this county. But the Democrat manufactures a bogus issue and says that we accuse Mr. Candidate Monk of "being in collusion with the parties interested in the Tombstone townsite." This we never said and never intended to.

What we did say, and do now positively assert is, that Mr. Monk is the candidate of G. G. Berry, Mike Gray and the townsite grabbers; and if elected, he will give his office to them, and they may expect a

strong revival of blackmailing suits; not that these suits are certain to be sustained, even by such a judge as E. R. Monk, but that Berry having the prestige of electing his own judge will be encouraged to bring these suits, and thereby frighten people into paying blackmail rather than pay to defend their homes. If the Democrat denies that Monk is Berry's and Gray's candidate, let it answer these questions. Who put up the slate on the day of the Democratic convention to defeat Judge Reilly and used proxies given them with instructions to vote for Judge Reilly for County Judge? Who, we say, but the men who knew and feared Judge Reilly as the inevitable enemy of frauds and blackmailing of every kind? Will the Democrat dare to deny that the very proxy by which Berry presided over that convention was given by Tom Givens, the owner, with instructions to vote for Reilly? We are willing to submit these questions to Judge Reilly, who is now advocating the Democratic ticket, because we know he will not lie nor help to impose on the people Judge Berry's tool for County Judge.
