The decision concludes as follows: "As wherever the United States exercises the power of government, whether under specific grant or through the dominion and sovereignty of plenary authority, as over the Hohenzollern Order. the Territories, that power includes the ultimate executive, legislative and judicial power, it follows that the judisdication of all inferior courts established may, in accordance with the constitution, be subjected to the appellate jurisdiction of the supreme judicial tribunal of the Government. WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.-Secretary Gresham has made a very strong representation to the German Government as to the injustice to the United States of the order prohibiting the importation of American cattle and fresh meat into Germany. He has protested that the action was taken without sufficient evidence of the existence of disease among the cattle exported from the United States or its contagious character or harmful effects. WASHINGTON, Oct. 29. - The United States Supreme Court to-day reversed the decision of the Circuit Court in the case of John C. Eno, formerly president of the Second National Bank of New York, convicted of forgery in a New York State court ten years ago. Eno raised the point that he could be tried only in the Federal courts.
