Beatrice Land Investors Think They're "Miked"

Beatrice, Neb., April 23.—Over 100 Beatrice citizens are indignant over the way Kinney County Land company of Texas handed them a gold brick, and they now threaten to go into court and call for an accounting. It seems that many people here bought contracts which were \$10 town and \$10 per month until \$200 had been paid in, when a large ranch would be cut up into small tracts and raffled off. Each buyer was to receive not less than ten acres and one town lot and given an equal chance at the big drawing when a number of twenty, forty, eighty and 160-acre tracts was to be disposed of. Beatrice people became suspicious and held a meeting and sent Dr. B. C. Cabbage there to investigate. He reported back that all the good land had already been deeded in advance and that all that remained was a lot of small tracts of land covered with brush. The local alleged "Mikes" have secured the services of lawyers and will carry the case into the court.

BRIDGE IS OUT

About Two Hundred Feet of Burlington's Burn Away.

The fire alarm was sounded last evening about 6:30, for box 32—Third ward, business section. However, the fire was about six miles away. Sparks, undoubtedly dropping from the fire box of a passing engine, had set fire to the Burlington bridge spanning the Platte river between this city and Phillips.

Help was summoned from this city. The department, as a matter of course, could be of no assistance. However, section men and other helpers were sent to the scene on an engine and the fire was checked by sawing off the burning ends and dropping them into the water. Fortunately the fire originated toward the eastern terminus of the bridge. A high wind would otherwise have hastened the destruction and made it more difficult to check. Traffic over the Burlington is being detoured via Central City and the Union Pacific, until the burned portion can be replaced.—Grand Island Independent.

Government Land Sale.

The U. S. land office of Broken Bow sold 840 acres of isolated land Monday in Thomas, Hooker and Logan counties to four different parties. There being no competition each tract offered sold for \$1.25.

The purchasers were William A. Howell of Thedford, Fay B. James and Alexander Kerns of Mullen and James Philpot of Gandy.

The largest tract sold was 480 acres and the smallest 40 acres. On the 21 John McMillan of Thedford 400 acres at \$1.25 an acre.
