

Carranza, Deposed, Killed by General Herrera's Forces Thursday Morning

COMPANIONS, FLEEING WITH HIM, ARE ALSO SLAIN; DETAILS ARE LACKING.

(By Associated Press.)

MEXICO CITY, May 22.—President Carranza, deposed president of the Republic of Mexico, who with a small party of his followers, has been a fugitive in the mountains of the state of Puebla since last week, was killed at Tlaxiahuacan early Thursday morning, according to official announcements made here today.

The circumstances of the manner of his death were not made public until late in the afternoon, when it was said that he had been shot in the back of the head by the fugitive president and his followers.

General Herrera belonged to the forces commanded by General Francisco Villarreal, who accompanied the deposed president in his flight from Mexico City. Herrera, however, was joined with the revolutionists.

There is some uncertainty as to the exact affiliation of General Herrera. It is generally believed possible that he commanded the guard which was firing with the president.

General Herrera, while in rebellion against Carranza, several years ago entered his rebellion in the state of Puebla. He surrendered last March to General Huerta, who constituted the governmental forces in that state.

When Huerta came over to the revolutionists last week, a portion of his troops in the state of Puebla were the only information before the government here today.

The manner of Carranza's death may have involved for a moment the question of recognition of the new government of Mexico.

When President Wilson declared to recognize Huerta after the killing of Huerta and Huerta, he said that he had a hard policy, that the United States would recognize no government not based on constitutional authority.

THIRTEEN, Guatemala, Mexico, May 22.—The forces of General Francisco Arce, who has not yet recognized the revolution, and which number 200 revolutionists, under Colonel Calles, yesterday gave battle to revolutionary troops under General Miguel Leizaola near Guadalupe, in the state of Durango. General Calles announced that seven of the Carranzistas were killed.
