STATE PENSIONS TO CIVIL WAR SOLDIERS

NOW REACH ABOUT \$200,000 PER ANNUM.

The State of Florida One of the Most Liberal of All States to Its Veterans.

Comptroller Croom's office has been the busiest in the capital since the first of October, preparing and sending out warrants in settlement of the regular quarterly payment of pensions to the old Confederate soldiers and to their widows. The work for the last quarter is now nearly completed, and the records show that up to date warrants have been sent to 2,800 pensioners, 1,759 of whom are old soldiers and 1,041 widows. It is expected that between 75 and 100 more warrants will be required to complete the quarterly payment, and these will be sent out within the next few days. It is estimated by the State Treasurer that it will require \$72,000 to pay the pensions for the quarter.

Florida is one of the most liberal of the Southern States in the granting of pensions to Confederate soldiers and their widows. The present law levies a state tax of 2 mills for the payment of pensions, which will raise a fund approximately of \$200,000 this year.

The first pensions were granted by the state in 1887. The state was not then in the best financial condition, and such restrictions and limitations were made in the law that only the very needy were able to comply with its provisions, and only about 350 pensioners were paid during that year. But at nearly every session of the Legislature since then the pension law has been amended and made more liberal. The present law places the enforcement of it in the hands of the Governor, Comptroller and Attorney General, and it is their duty to pass upon all applications for pensions. Any person who served in the Confederate army or navy, and who is permanently disabled by reason of wounds or disease, or who is more than sixty-five years of age, and any widow of a Confederate soldier who is not possessed of \$800 in property, is entitled to a pension varying from \$25 to \$100 per annum.

Though many pensioners have been, and are being, dropped from the list on account of death and other causes, yet the roll is increasing almost daily. The records show that in January, 1903, there had been granted since 1887, pensions to 1,347 males and 329 females. In January, 1904, the number had increased to 1,759 males and 1,037 females, and the total to date that have been granted by the board since 1887 is 3,298. Of course, from the above numbers must be deducted those who have been stricken from the lists from death or other causes.

To show how the amount of money needed for pension purposes is increasing, the state treasurer's report for the first quarter of 1903 shows an expenditure of \$40,631.91 for this purpose; for the second quarter, \$42,766.36; for the third quarter, \$44,375.23; and for the fourth quarter, \$46,845.02, making a total of \$174,618.52 expended during the year 1903. The amount derived from the 2-mill tax was \$196,215.48, which left a balance in the treasury for the year from this fund of only \$7,596.96. There was expended \$69,063.25 for the second quarter of 1904, and it is estimated that \$72,000 will be required for the third quarter, and as the fourth quarter will be an increase

over the third, it will be seen that the \$200,000 which it has been estimated will be derived this year from the 2-mill tax will hardly be sufficient to pay all the pensions in full. In such a contingency the law provides the money shall be prorated. The pension law is one of the problems that will have to be solved by the Legislature of 1905. The millage will have to be increased, more limitations placed in the law, or the prorating continued. If the Legislature should increase the millage, the money derived from it will not be available until 1906, and in the meantime the number of pensioners is daily increasing, causing a larger division of the amount to be prorated.
