## HON. JOSEPH G. CAMP

Lectured at the Baptist Church on Wednesday Evening.

The ladies of the W. C. T. U. provided the citizens of Arcadia a rare treat in bringing to this city the noted orator, Hon. Joseph G. Camp, of Georgia. Mr. Camp lectured at the First Baptist church Wednesday evening under the auspices of the local W. C. T. U., the subject of his lecture being "The American King." The audience filled the main auditorium of the church, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather. Excellent music, vocal and instrumental, was rendered by members of the choir of the city.

The speaker of the evening was introduced by Rev. J. W. Vesey, pastor of the Baptist church. The lecture was a masterly portrayal of the dignity of manhood, and an earnest plea for independent thought; he concluded with a terrific arraignment of the liquor traffic, and denounced it as the greatest enemy of the home. The speaker held his audience for two hours under a veritable avalanche of oratory and wit. He urged the people to rally to the support of the W. C. T. U., which he described as the pioneer temperance organization. The audience was much pleased and highly appreciated the efforts of the ladies in securing such valued entertainment.
