Brief Happenings From Various Sections of State.

Heavy rains have ended the water famine at Key West.

A new ice plant will be built at Tampa, making four in all.

A new steamer will be put on the route from Tampa to Mobile.

The Jacksonville baseball team will not open the regular season until April 20th.

Over 250 school children from Indianapolis have been touring Florida this week.

Tarpon Springs has decided by ballot to have an electric lighting plant and water works.

There has been \$9,560 tons of phosphate rock shipped from Punta Gorda so far this year.

Postmaster Hildreth has at last got his commission and is now installed in the Live Oak postoffice.

The Times-Union says that Duval county would build more good roads with less talk and more work.

The shipping of fruits from Central America to Tampa, the coming winter, will be a good thing for Florida.

The Dade county circuit court opened on Monday for the April term with a big bunch on the docket, and many cases will be carried over.

The Detroit baseball team begins a series in Jacksonville on Friday, playing three days. The Jays will give them a hustle for their money.

Saunderson is soon to be connected by long distance telephone with the outside world. Some people would be satisfied if they could get good connections in their own town.

The Mid-Winter Fair, to be held in Tampa, will have reduced passenger rates on the railroads of the State, and it is hoped there will be reduced rates on exhibits.

Hon. T. J. Appleyard of the Lake City Index has a Bible that has been in Col. Appleyard's family over 200 years—about ten years before it was published.

Mrs. Roosevelt and her children are said to be cruising in Florida waters near Miami. Gee whiz, Florida water is considered pretty rich for the toilet by some ladies.

KIRBY SMITH CHAPTER.

Daughters of the Confederacy Will Hold Important Meeting Today.

The regular monthly meeting of Kirby Smith Chapter, U. D. C., will be held at the house of the president, Mrs. J. N. Strobhar, this afternoon at 3 o'clock. A full attendance is earnestly desired, as there is important business to be transacted. Delegates to the State Convention, which will meet at Pensacola on May 3, must be elected at this meeting in order to send the names to the Pensacola chapter promptly. Kirby Smith wishes to send her full quota of delegates—four in number—besides the president, who has an independent vote at the State Convention; making the number of votes from Kirby Smith five.
