THE YELLOW FEVER.

New Orleans is Gaining on the Disease. Spreading in the Country.

New Orleans, August 23.—The efforts of the hospital people seem to be giving evidence of success, but there can be no relaxation from the persistent efforts of those who have the work before them. The disease will be stamped out above Canal street. The local and federal authorities are working in harmony.

There were 23 new cases up to noon today and only four deaths. Six outlying towns report 11 new cases and one death.

The quarantine force is felt in the small towns and should it long continue a food famine will follow.

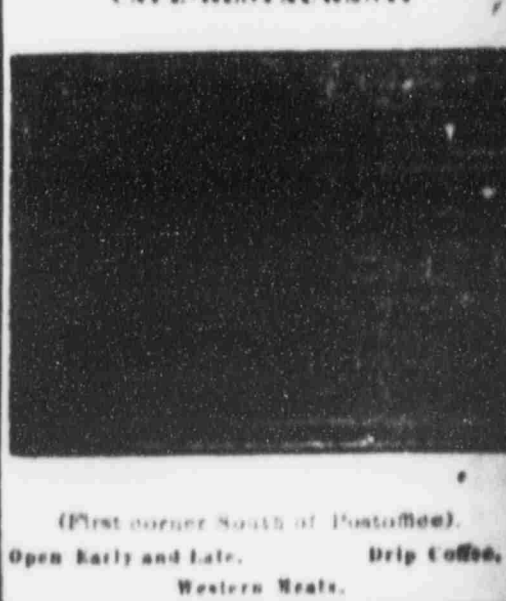
