Gainesville, October 3, 1905.—The board of County Commissioners met this day as required by statute. Present, J. G. Dampier, chairman; J. G. Osteen, U. C. Pedrick, F. F. Paulling and J. F. Townsend.

The meeting being called to order, W. W. Colson, tax assessor, appeared before the board and reported that the books were not ready and would not be ready before the 10th instant, as he did not had time to make the marginal notes on books of the sale of lands sold by the collector September 4, 1905.

Birmingham, Ala., Oct 7.—The report of the state auditor for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 shows gains in every department of the state's income. The total income was \$3,356,337, an increase over the preceding year of \$132,000. The convict department turned in \$561,241. The insurance department shows double the income of the preceding year. The total educational fund collected amounted to \$1,026,000.
