

## MARSHAL ARNOW MADE BIG HAUL

HE AND POLICEMAN OWENS  
DID THE WORK.

Two Houses of Ill-fame Pulled for  
Operating Within the City  
Limits—Cases Postponed.

Marshal Arnow and Policeman Owens again got busy on Friday night and made some important arrests, and this class of people will probably hereafter steer clear of the city limits.

The first arrest was that of Adel Lauther, charged with keeping a house of ill-fame within the city limits. The mayor gave the defendant time to secure witnesses and adjourned her trial until 9 o'clock Monday morning.

A young man, charged with being an inmate of this house, forfeited a cash bond of \$25, which had been deposited with the marshal.

Mabel Clarke and mother, Hester Clarke, were also arrested on the same charge, but the big-hearted mayor gave them time to secure witnesses and postponed her hearing until 9 o'clock on Monday.

Bud Faircloth was arrested as an inmate and was required to put up cash bond, which was forfeited.

A. L. Gaskins also forfeited a cash bond of \$5 on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Numerous complaints have been made to the officers regarding the houses and the last two women have been complained of on numerous occasions. At one time they were ordered to leave the city, but again moved back, defying the law.
