Whites Largely Outnumber Negroes. RUN-OVER LOCALS.

Not infrequently one hears speculation as to the relative number of whites and blacks comprised in Florida's population, and the guesses are usually wide apart. The census report just issued from the office of Commissioner of Agr culture McLin shows that the State has 348.923 whites and 265,737 negroes, or 83,186 more whites then negroes. In thirtythree of the forty-five counties the

whites largely outnumber the negroes. In the remaining twelve counties the negroes are largely in the ma-
