### PROPOSED CHARTER OF THE "FLORIDA SUMATRA LEAF TOBACCO COMPANY."

The undersigned hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida, regulating the creation, organization and management of corporations for profit, and do hereby accept such law as their organic law and do hereby adopt the following as their articles of incorporation for the transaction of business under the following charter:

### ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF FLORIDA SUMATRA LEAF TOBACCO COMPANY.

#### ARTICLE I.

Section 1. The name of this corporation shall be the "FLORIDA SUMATRA LEAF TOBACCO COMPANY."

Section 2. The general offices and principal places of business of the corporation shall be at Madison, in Madison county and State of Florida, but such branch offices, agencies and places of business may be established elsewhere, and plantations, farms, factories and other branches may be conducted, run and operated as may be necessary and convenient or the board of directors shall from time to time determine upon.

#### ARTICLE II.

Section 1. The general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation shall be that of growing, planting, cultivating, curing, buying, packing, manufacturing, selling or handling for profit or otherwise, tobacco of all kinds, of exporting, importing and generally dealing in leaf tobacco, cigars and cigarettes and other branches may be conducted, run and operated as may be necessary and convenient or the board of directors shall from time to time determine upon.

This corporation shall have the right to make advances on tobacco or other growing crops and to contract for tobacco or other crops, to buy and sell fuel, farm implements, horses, mules, live stock and other persons property of every description, and to mortgage and encumber the same. This corporation shall have the right to conduct a general brokerage business, and to own stock in other corporations, or own an interest in any other business or occupation, and shall have the right to make and manufacture any and all things, or engage in any and all lines of business that may be incident to, connected with or necessary to the carrying out of the objects, intents and purposes aforementioned, and at such times and places as may be deemed expedient.

It shall have, use and enjoy all the rights, powers and privileges granted to corporations of this character by the general incorporation laws of the State of Florida.

#### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The capital stock of this corporation shall be Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars, divided into five hundred shares, each share to be of the par value of One Hundred Dollars, to be paid in by the subscribers to said capital stock in such sums and at such times as may be required by the board of directors, or by the by-laws, but said corporation shall have the privilege of increasing its capital stock to Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars.

Section 2. The capital stock of this corporation may be payable either wholly or in part in cash, or may be issued or used, either wholly or in part for the purchase of property, contracts, labor or service at just valuation thereof, to be fixed by the Board of Directors at a meeting to be called for that purpose.

#### ARTICLE IV.

##### Term of Existence.

Section 1. The corporate existence of this corporation shall begin at the issuance of Letters Patent and shall terminate ninety-nine years thereafter.

#### ARTICLE V.

##### Directors and Officers.

Section 1. The business of this corporation shall be conducted and managed by a President, Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and a Board of Directors of not less than three nor more than fifteen, and by such other officers and agents and

servants as the Board of Directors may provide for from time to time.

The number of Directors shall be fixed and determined by the by-laws of this corporation.

Section 2. The duties of the President, Vice President, Secretary and the Treasurer, and such other officers as may be provided for, shall be such as usually pertain to those offices, unless otherwise provided for by the by-laws.

Section 3. The time, place and manner of calling and holding meetings of the stockholders and directors, except when regulated by law or by the charter, shall be fixed in the by-laws of the corporation. The election of the directors shall be by ballot, each stockholder to be entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned by him.

Section 4. The officers who are to manage and conduct the business and affairs of this corporation until those elected at the first election, shall be T. C. Smith, President; B. W. Cate, First Vice President; W. B. Cate, Second Vice President; A. Livingston, Jr., Secretary, and L. A. Fraleigh, Treasurer; and J. E. Hardee, T. C. Smith, B. W. Cate, L. A. Fraleigh, Ola Sanders, C. B. Ashley, A. E. Fraleigh, Walter Bunting, W. B. Cate, A. Livingston, Jr., and J. B. Thomas shall constitute the Board of Directors until their successors are elected on the first Thursday in October, A. D. 1908, the same being the first annual meeting day for each and every year unless changed by the by-laws.

Section 5. The Board of Directors shall provide for the election or appointment and fix the duties of such other officers or agents as may be deemed necessary, and shall make such rules and regulations to take such action, not inconsistent with the charter and the by-laws of the corporation as they may deem advisable and proper, to regulate and carry on the business of the corporation to the best interest of the business and the stockholders.

#### ARTICLE VI.

##### Limit of Indebtedness.

Section 1. The corporation shall at no time incur an indebtedness or liability of over One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars.

#### ARTICLE VII.

##### Corporate Seal.

Section 1. The corporate seal of this corporation shall be an impress stamp, circular in form, bearing the words: "FLORIDA SUMATRA LEAF TOBACCO COMPANY," "MADISON, FLORIDA," "SEAL, 1907."

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Section 1. The stockholders of this corporation shall adopt by-laws not inconsistent with the charter of this corporation and the laws of the State of Florida, for the government of its officers and the proper management of its business.

The by-laws first adopted shall be adopted by a vote of the majority of all the shares of the capital stock present of the corporation at the time subscribed, and they may be amended in the manner provided for in the by-laws.

The foregoing articles of incorporation are this day approved, adopted and signed as the proposed charter of a corporation, at a meeting held for that purpose in the town of Madison, county of Madison and State of Florida.
