The Place For And Function of a Community Building

It is believed that, prejudice aside, the majority of the citizens of Lakeland will agree that a Community Building which may serve as a center of community service and expression, would be a more fitting memorial of the soldiers and sailors in the recent world war than any marble shaft, arch or other silent witness, no matter how beautiful.

The National Committee on Memorials have advocated the "Living Memorial" and particularly the "Community House," types of which have already been erected, while others are in course of construction.

If there is room in the Park for such a building (and there seems to be) it should be erected there for many reasons:

First. It is public property and appropriate for such use.

Second. No money will have to be spent or commissions paid in a real estate transaction in order to secure any other suitable site.

Third. Any other suitable site would cost a large part of the total amount of money which may be available for the entire project.

Fourth. Municipal control could be better exercised and maintained on municipal property.

Fifth. The donor of the Park, with splendid vision, made provision in the original grant to the city for the erection of a building when the time should come.

Sixth. During the winter season our visitors congregate in the Park as the one restful spot in the busy center of things. The building in one corner (provided by the donor of the Park) would be so much more useful and attractive to these visitors.

Seventh. A building thus located would attract many thousands of people annually who would see it from the railroad.

There are also many other reasons, which will easily suggest themselves, as to the desirability of such a building being located in the Park.

Every community needs a central public hall, bearing some relation to the population, for a variety of civic purposes—the consideration of local or national questions—the celebration of civic festivals, conventions, community signs, and where more particularly, in which to house and entertain our winter visitors who are not going to continue coming here in increasing numbers without this feature, which other towns have already provided for or are taking immediate steps to do.

It is believed here by prominent men that if such a community building scheme as is proposed does not go through that no effort to locate it elsewhere will be successful on account of the discouragement connected with past effort and the increased cost involved, in which case Lakeland will still continue to be handicapped for a suitable place in which to entertain winter visitors next season.

That these winter visitors are a very valuable asset to the city can be easily demonstrated by inquiry of the banks, mercantile houses, hotels, restaurants, boarding and rooming houses, in whose profits every citizen shares directly or indirectly.

The entire cost of the building and equipment should be raised by popular subscription in a campaign conducted along the lines of a Red Cross or United War Work Drive. To exact the funds by taxation would rob the building of its true nature as a thank offering. No citizen should be COMPELLED in this matter to show his gratitude to our soldiers and sailors. Societies which might occupy rooms in the building should provide the furnishings for such rooms at their own expense and pay a suitable fixed charge on account of upkeep, consisting of insurance, heating, lighting, repairs, janitor service, etc.

The building should never be allowed to become a charge on the city and will not if associations doing civic and welfare work in the community are allowed a place there. Here it may be said that it is well known by unprejudiced persons that the Board of Trade or Chamber of Commerce of Lakeland has been the one instrument to which credit belongs for the development which has taken place during the years of that association's existence, and to discredit that association in any way or attempt to cast reflection upon it, in connection with this or any other issue is to reflect upon the representative business men of the organization who have unselfishly put their time and money into it all of these past years.

Through a Board of Trustees the city should hold and maintain permanent control of the building and enact a suitable ordinance to take care of all matters connected therewith.

Such a building would be worth to

one year to the business interests of Lakeland all that it would cost. This from a purely commercial standpoint. As a community center for the creation and development of moral, mental and aesthetic activity, especially upon the rising generation; as an evidence of thoughtful interest in the continued stream of winter visitors, and for many other worthy reasons outside of the purely physical, no action which the citizens of Lakeland could take at this time could be more sane, safe and reasonable.

As an evidence of the honor in which we hold our soldiers and sailors, not the bronze tablets which should have place therein but the life and activity possible day by day and every day while such a building might stand would be a permanent and living evidence of that which it would be impossible to make any mere shaft of marble or granite ever to symbolize satisfactorily.

As some one has well said: "Let our memorials of this conflict be structures which shall help the living while commemorating the dead."

The Proposed Memorial Building in the Park will INCREASE THE AVAILABLE SPACE FOR USE 7,000 SQUARE FEET.

The building as proposed will occupy about 50x70 feet, making 3,500 square feet which will furnish 10,500 square feet for use, the building having three floors, which means two floors extra in Park.

Mr. Munn set aside 10,000 square feet at this corner for a building which is 6,500 square feet more than proposed building will occupy. No trees will be destroyed, it will not obscure view of the Park, will add to the beauty and attractiveness of the Park and greatly increase the space for use in the Park.

It is proposed to be of Brick, Stone and Granite in harmony with Park. If built in the Park as proposed it will furnish a home for the Boy Scouts, Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. quarters and accommodations. Reading Room and Library, accommodations for Tourists, a Memorial Hall for lectures, social, civic and society meetings, a committee room for Tourists and public use, besides there will be space for other civic bodies doing public work if they will pay rental to help keep up expenses of building. The proposed plan will give Lakeland a moral civic center the value of which can not be computed in dollars and cents.

It will be a Living Memorial of Good Works and Good Deeds making its impress on the minds and hearts of the present and future generations in a land of Liberty, Justice and Service vouchsafed and perpetuated by the supreme sacrifice and service of our War Heroes.

Every Citizen of Lakeland and vicinity should feel it a patriotic privilege to make a liberal contribution to such a worthy cause.

If each citizen will only do their duty to the War Heroes and the City ample funds can be raised by a free will offering without any sacrifice and be an honor to the Patriotism of Lakeland.

Understand the Vote on Tuesday, April the First is Only to decide if a Memorial Building shall be placed in the Park.

NO OTHER QUESTION IS TO BE SETTLED BY THAT VOTE.

It is the duty of every property owner to vote.
