While the bill offered by Mr. Wartmann is not siecific on this point, he is sure that it is sufficiently effective to cover it, for it was a design of the bill to make stich practices impossible.
When the bill against tipping was offered, Representative Melton arose to explain how the expression "tip" originated, which he didn't do. "Uncle Steve"" said that he never knew what the word meant until he traveled in England, and then he didn't know, but at the door of
