BROWARD WILL BE A CANDIDATE.

States Positively That He Will Oppose
Re-Election of Senator Taliaferro.

That former Governor Napoleon B.
Broward is a candidate for United States
senator is assured in an interview which
he gave in St. Augustine.

Broward is a factor and an important
one in the politics of the State, and it is
generally conceded that the race will be
between him and United States Senator
James P. Taliaferro. The St. August-
ine Record, in speaking of the matter
says:

"Ex-Gov. Broward will be a candi-
date for United States senator at the
next primary. This question, which has
been discussed by the State press fre-
quently of late is answered.

MADE DIRECT ANSWER.

"Mr. Broward spent yesterday in the
city and was interviewed by a Record
representative. He was asked the ques-
tion direct and he answered it as
straight as it was asked, without quib-
bling or beating about the bush. He
said that he intended to become a candi-
date, but that is very early to make an
announcement or to launch the cam-
paign. He will be found a very active
factor when the campaign opens, being
a hard fighter and a tireless worker.

"His business here yesterday was of
a private nature, and he had no inten-
tion whatever of announcing his candi-
dacy until he was accosted by the Re-
cord representative, but he did not hesi-
tate to state his position when asked.

"In speaking of the drainage work in
the Everglades he said the dredges are
doing very effective work and that an
immense area will be reclaimed. He
has not changed his opinion as to the
advisability of draining the Everglades
and still believes that the State will
greatly profit by the reclamation of the
overflowed land."
