Woman Dies from Robbery Beating

GALESBURG, Ill., Sept. 24. (C)—Mrs. Matilda Green, 143 South West street, who was reported to have been attacked and seriously injured by two robbers in her home August 26, died Wednesday afternoon in St. Mary's hospital.

Mrs. Green was an old and highly respected citizen of Galesburg and a faithful member of the Second Baptist church. Her funeral services were conducted on Friday afternoon, with the pastor, Rev. W. T. Green, in charge.

Italy Moves Into New Area

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 24. (C)—An Italian motorized column left here Sunday for Gore, in Western Ethiopia where it is reported an Ethiopian government is operating. The army was composed of Eritreans and Ethiopians loyal to Italy. With the troops were Ras Ailu and his Gogjam warriors. Ailu had been kept a prisoner for months by Haile Selassie, who suspected him of pro-Italian sympathies. In a renewed attack on the capital last Thursday, it was reported 600 Ethiopians and 60 Italians were killed.

Night School Classes Open

Enrollment in the adult night school at the Phoenix Union Colored High School, Fifth and Grant streets, began last Monday, September 21. Registration will continue for the next few days. Classes will begin Monday evening, September 28, at 7:30 o'clock.

The school is a project of the Works Progress Administration's emergency educational program. Mr. Roy A. Leen, principal of the Colored High school, is in charge of the instruction program.

Instruction will be given in English, Spanish, shorthand, typing, arithmetic, beginners reading and writing, homemaking courses. Other courses will be given as the needs arise.

Those who have registered will be permitted to enroll during next week.

From all indications the enrollment this year will be much larger than that of last year. Much interest has been shown in these classes and the public in general is being aroused to the advantages of adult education, according to Mr. Lee.

WOMAN GETS THREE YEARS FOR MURDER

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (C) Miss Mary Bradley got three years in state prison Friday for the slaying of Miss Winona Sims on July 1, when she pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter.

Two White Men Sent to Jail for Beating Colored

DURHAM, N. C. (C)—Coleman Noell and Claude Greenhill, white youths, were sentenced to serve nine months on the roads (chain-gang) by Judge Walter Bass in recorder's court Friday for the brutal beating of Solomon Bennett on the lawn of the Durham Hospital. Bennett was severely beaten on the head with a brick and a stick of wood, the injuries sending him to the hospital for two weeks. Noell drew six months when he pleaded guilty, and Greenhill, who was found guilty, got 3 months.
