

Elk Pay Tribute To Departed Brothers Memorial Service at the Opera House, Beautiful and Impressive

Hon. Elias S. Clark Eulogizes Absent Members

With a sky overcast with heavy clouds and cold winds sighing a mournful dirge that seemed in keeping with the occasion, Winslow Lodge No. 536, B. P. O. E., conforming to the annual custom of the order throughout the country, met last Sunday afternoon in the Opera House to do honor to their departed brothers. The exercises being open to the public the hall was comfortably filled before the local lodge headed by its officers and each wearing a carnation in the lapel, filed in to the accompaniment of the Pilgrim's Funeral March by Thannhauser. The stage and hall were beautifully and tastefully decorated with a profusion of roses, chrysanthemums, smilax and ferns, and an Elk head draped with flowers and the white and purple of the order occupied the front center of stage. The opening exercises conducted by Exalted Ruler W. G. Kelley was followed by the roll call of absent brothers sign of grief by the impressive sign of grief by the lodge standing. The song, "Our Absent Brothers" sung by the lodge and joined in by the audience was followed by the invocation delivered by Rev. T. M. Connolly.

Arthur C. Smith in his usually pleasing style, rendered a vocal solo, "The Homeland" by Hanscom.

Father Connolly's address touching the key note of the observance, was favorably received and in part was as follows:

"The annual Memorial Day presents a beautiful custom; one that as for benevolent organizations are concerned is peculiarly your own; a custom which could solely have sprung spontaneously from hearts who practice with fidelity the principles of Charity, Justice and Brotherly Love. These three virtues form the basis of your order.

Can the intelligence of man conceive a more permanent foundation to promote a spirit of fraternity among men here below?

This trinity of virtues is capable eventually of changing this 'Vale of Tears' into a veritable paradise. With you the faults of your brothers are written on the sand, their virtues upon tablets of love and memory.

What a stinging rebuke does not this motto administer to the world at large in our day.

Every human being here below should be the realization of some ideal, either in the mind of the Creator, or in the mind of man. He who fails entirely in the one or the other respect, has lived in vain.

Let me say in conclusion, to be true to your principals and true to yourselves, and you will not fail to become and continue good and worthy men, and creditable."

"Oh, Devine Redeemer" a vocal solo rendered by Miss Jessica Reed was truly beautiful and touched a sympathetic chord in the hearts of. Miss Reed possesses a voice rich in tone and volume and her promising future in the vocal world should be a source of pride to the people of Winslow.

The memorial address by Hon. Elias S. Clark of Prescott was masterful and eloquent. His eulogy of the deceased members, F. M. Zuck and A. F. McAllister

was rendered doubly pathetic by his life long intimacy with the departed brothers and his appreciation of their sterling qualities.

His speech in part is as follows: "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament showeth His handiwork." So the immortal soul, which takes abode with every mortal during the brief journey from the cradle to the grave, is likewise of his handiwork, and when released from its tenement of clay, we may well believe that it wings its way far hence, to lend heightened grace and beauty to the firmament of everlasting brotherhood. And even though it be only in the flights poetic fancy that we set the souls of our brothers among the visible diadems of the arching skies, yet our faith that they have been received into the 'house not made by hands, eternal in the heavens,' is behind the call that brings us together today to commemorate their virtues.

My brothers and friends, if nothing more resulted from these annual gatherings of a great fraternity then the consciousness of having rendered just respect to the memory of the dead, we should still feel the current of our daily lives setting more strongly toward nobler purpose and higher hope. But the value of memorial day may be greatly enhanced and the Order itself raised to a still higher plane of usefulness if we shall learn and practice the lessons suggested by the spirit of the occasion.

The outposts of this great Order are, in the grace of God, destined to light the place where men now strive in darkness, and its Lodge dotted over the surface of the whole globe, shall so illuminate the hearts of men that malice and vile shall find no home there.

"And that light shall sweep and circle to the very ends of the earth.

Touching with immortal beauty every heart and every hearth."
