## Arizona Refuses To Lift Quarantine

The Arizona State Agricultural Commission has reported it would be impossible to comply with the request of Governor Hobby, of Texas, that Arizona's quarantine against importation of cotton seed, lint and cotton products from Texas be removed or modified.

The request was referred by Governor Campbell to the State Commission on Agriculture and Horticulture, whose chairman, E. W. Hudson, drafted the following reply for transmission to Governor Hobby: "Inasmuch as the cotton quarantine of Arizona was adopted November 16, 1917, and amended June 26, 1919, to protect the cotton culture of the State, not only from the pink boll worm but from the boll weevil, pests which now exist in Texas and may be carried by the aforesaid cotton products, it would be impossible for the Arizona commission to modify the quarantine." Governor Hobby had objected to a statewide quarantine. He pointed out that the federal department of agriculture had on July 14th last, established a quarantine against interstate shipments from that area in Texas which might be determined to be infested with the pink boll worm. In view of that action, the governor requested the Arizona authorities to either withdraw the state quarantine order completely or at least to so modify it as to make it conform to the federal quarantine.

## Arizona Cotton Crop Valued at \$36,000,000

Although the local staple cotton crop is three or four weeks late, officials of the Arizona American-Egyptian Cotton Growers' Association, said Saturday, that plants were fruiting rapidly and heavily. The movement of the regular crop, not volunteer, would be under way by September 15th, it was estimated, with a probable yield of 72,000 bales. Last year's crop was about 30,000 bales less than the forecast for this year. On an average price of \$1 a pound throughout the season, the value of the 1920 crop, as forecast, would be \$36,000,000.

## Watch Now for Diseased Cotton

Diseased cotton plants, recently sent in by the county agricultural agent, are reported back by J. G. Brown, of the University of Arizona, as suffering from black arm, or angular leaf spot. It is manifest on the plant either by angular, black spots on the leaves, or water-soaked spots on the stem, followed by them turning black, which so weakens the plant that it breaks off easily. There are no extensive affections of this kind in the valley, but growers should be on the lookout for it and if they find much present in their fields, they should arrange to secure seed from another source this fall. Most of the Mebane cotton brought in from Yuma is free from this disease. The disease is carried over in the soil and also in the seed of the affected plants. Widely known effective remedies to control this disease are not to be found. So get clean seed next year.

## To Organize Fruit Growers of Valley

A canvass is now being made of all Gila valley fruit growers, as a result of two meetings last week, called to consider plans for a fruit growers' organization, with the view of ascertaining the sentiment of the valley toward such an organization.

The purpose of this organization will be to assist the growers of fruit, vegetables and garden truck; to increase and improve their product; to investigate and give out information regarding markets; to aid its members in the marketing of their crops; to standardize the pack and package, and to assist its members to profitably utilize low grade fruit and vegetables by means of evaporation and canning factories.

The results of this canvass will be tabulated and discussed at a meeting to be held tomorrow, Saturday, August 7th, at 4:00 p. m., on Andrew Kimball's lawn, in Thatcher. If enough interest is shown definite steps will be taken to form a fruit growers' organization.

## SPRAY FRUIT TREES NOW

The next spraying of apple and pear trees should be made as soon as possible. While the fruit is now nearly full grown in size, a large amount of injury may be done by the last generation of worms, which will appear in a few days. Growers are urged to have the spraying completed by August 12th, if possible. One pound of powdered arsenate of lead to 50 gallons of water is sufficient, more is an extra expense and liable to cause spray injury on the fruit. Thorough work must be done if any benefit is to be derived, otherwise time and labor will be saved by dumping the spray dope in the ditch.
