### TELEPHONE CALL LURES TO DEATH

ICA LESSON MAKES DESPAIR AND VAIN STRUGGLE

Refuse to Believe City Victim of the "White Slaves"—There Are No Cities Whatever.

Chicago—Miss Anna G. Leeson, art student, whose body was found in the Chicago River at 4:30 a.m., was believed to be dead by some man who telephoned to her in response to her advertisement for a place as a nurse. This was the conclusion of the police after more than twenty-four hours' search, which resulted in the police adding to the trail that can direct them to the murderer.

The thin slender fair face found near the body and the crushed ringlets set around Miss Leeson's neck, showed her the manner of her death. Her ruptured clothes showed her half a mile along the road approaching the bridge and the bushes on the body indicated her death came only after she had made a brief struggle but once was unable to move or show by whom Miss Leeson had been induced to make the many trips on the western highway to the city.

After giving up her position as a school teacher in a Hazel City school, Miss Leeson went to Chicago and engaged a room with Mrs. James A. Johnson, saying she was going to try to earn more money to continue her art studies. Saturday she reported as a telephone in a paper seeking for a place as a trained nurse.

Saturday afternoon a telephone call came from a old woman who said Miss Leeson had not reported herself after her personal appearance. At 4:30 a.m. the police were called again and asked her to go to a point on the river bank to take her body.

The street address given by the woman proved to be a record of no address. A portion of the address of the vicinity of the garage where she worked, helped to locate Anna G.

The possibility that Miss Leeson was used to her death by an unknown individual, if "White Slaves" could be as represented by the police, was discounted by them in favor of a theory of the accident. As investigation ensued it became known to the officers of Chicago and to the art students in general that the numerous women had been snared by the "White Slaves" and had no place to turn, and that the girls had been forced to work.

**HUERTA SHAKES UP CABINET**  
Results in Complete Change of Ministry Except War Portfolio.

MEXICO CITY.—Another general shakeup in the Huerta cabinet resulted in a complete change in the ministry with the exception of the war portfolio. Minister of Communications and post office, José M. Lázaro.

Minister of War, General Alvarado Diaz, retains the portfolio.

This created a statement from Peck in which he characterized Marshall's attack upon him as a "lie" told for pay.

### REBEL CAPITAL CAPTURED

Federal Army in Possession of Piedras Negras.

BAGNARIA, Texas.—Without a shot or a single act of destruction, Federal soldiers captured Piedras Negras, constitutional provisional capital across the Rio Grande from here. It was the city's second bloodless capture in the present war. Early in the summer it was taken from the rebels, without a fight, by General Carranza, the constitutional leader, who proclaimed it his capital. Only one company of constitutional soldiers remained in Piedras Negras. Most of the day the intense heat, which is high here, was intense, while they had waited at the south entrance. ### HUERTA JAILS HIS CONGRESS

HE ARE LOOSED IN PENITENTIARY AT MEXICO CITY

Mexican President Alvaro Obregon to Withdraw Charging Responsibility.

MEXICO CITY.—Obregon and 100 members of the chamber of deputies who had signed resolutions of withdrawal of President Huerta as the result of the disappearance of Dr. Belmont Dominguez, a member of the chamber, were arrested and locked in the penitentiary. Five hundred deputies who signed the resolution were absent when a series of charges was directed against the executive, resulting with several hundred members arrested the chamber.

General Dominguez early in the month made a speech in the Senate attacking Obregon, charging that he had nothing but hate for the president of the country, but that the present situation in the republic was infinitely worse than before. He said the currency of Mexico had depreciated, stocks raised and that things deteriorated.

He added that the situation existed from and foreseen by the fact that Mexican people could not longer trust him to be protected by Obregon.

Before the vote for the regularization of the session of the chamber the members and most of the buildings had been packed with troops. Scores of police were scattered through the city.

The arrests followed a demand by President Obregon that the members would withdraw the original decree in a signed act of guarantee for their personal safety.

When the deputies were in their places Obregon, of the former National Army, addressed the chamber.

General Obregon, who is from the Chihuahua State, spoke of the recent

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YUAN SHIKAI ON THE JOB.

China's First President inaugurated at Peking.

PEKING.—Tzou-Si Kai was induced into office as the president of the Chinese republic. The ceremony of inauguration was attended with eastern splendor, attended by scores of distinguished officials, diplomats and military officials, and took place in the interior of the Tsu-Tu-Pao building in which many of the Manchu and Chinese emperors had been crowned.

While the emperor was in the city, the Emperor-elect was seated on the throne, and the members of the chamber of deputies, who had signed the original decree, were seated in the audience.

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
