ANOTHER ON ROADS.

EDITOR MATHIEWS JOURNAL: I saw in a recent issue of The Journal an article by Mr. S. G. Miller concerning the roads and last week several more communications of the same nature.

What they said is all right but I think it lies very much with the citizens to help keep the roads as well as with the road workers. The Road Overseer very often has ditches dug and then the citizens will drive across it and fill it up and if he says anything to them they become offended.

I think that every man that has a front on the road ought to keep the bushes cut around the ditches so that the water can more readily run in and the sun dry the road. I have a front on the road about a mile of it, and I keep the bushes cut and the ditch in good shape and it has not cost the county \$5 in ten years as Mr. George Mason who knows, can testify.

If this piece can be kept up at so small a cost, lots of it could be taken care of by people who have fronts on the road. But many of them want the county to dig and cut off the bushes too.

I have one of the largest ditches on any road in the county and it has not cost the county a cent. I had it cut and clean it out every three years.

SOUTHSIDE AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION MEETING, Mathews County, Virginia, October 16, 17, and 18, 1912.

CONDITIONS—Rules of the National Trotting Association govern, with exceptions. Purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent.

A horse distancing the field or any part thereof entitled to first money only. Entrance fee 5 per cent. of purse and 5 per cent. additional from money winners. Two or more horses under the same ownership, or controlled or trained in the same stable may start in any race—two horses from the same stable may be entered in one class at the cost of a single entry. If both horses are started two entrance fees must be paid. But one entrance fee will be required if either horse starts. One horse may be named in two classes, and will be held for only one entrance fee unless started in both. If no start is made will be held for entrance to both classes. Pneumatic tire carts will be classed as sulkey in races. Hopples allowed, except on colts. Races to be mile heats, best 3 in 5 to harness, except colt race, which will be best 2 in 3. 3 seconds will be allowed horses with mile track records, providing it does not place them above their 1/2 mile records. Horses entered in a class that does not fill will be entitled to transfer that entry to any class to which they are eligible if notice is given to the Secretary before 7 o'clock p. m., October 14th. Right reserved to change order of program or declare off any race not filling satisfactorily. 3 to enter 2 to start. Races will be called at 1 p. m. Entries close Oct. 9, at 11 p. m.
