Valentine, Neb., March 6, 1911.
The board of county commissioners as per adjournment with following members present: J. A. Adamson, temporary chairman, and J. F. Naylor.
The board spent the day in consideration of bids filed for performing the road work on the Hansen hill as per advertisement therefor.

March 7, 1911.

The board entered into a contract with B. C. Lovejoy and Rene A. Canet for road work to be done on the Hansen hill as per plans and specifications heretofore approved, and bid filed as per call, the contract price said work being the sum of \$240. The bond submitted by the above named contractors was approved.

The county clerk is instructed to draw warrants on the general fund in relation of the following tax sale certificates, the lands therein described being government land and erroneously sold:
