

MOTING IN BRUSSELS

Populace Collides With Military In Belgian Capital.

LEGISLATORS IN A FREE FIGHT.

Vote of Confidence In President of the Chamber Is Followed by an Uproar. Lawmaker Seriously Hurt In the Fray. Wild Scenes In the City.

BRUSSELS, June 29.—Numerous crowded meetings were held last night to protest against the electoral reform bill. At a late hour the demonstrators assembled in the neighborhood of parliament house, the government offices and the palaces, all of which were protected by the police. The efforts of the latter and of the civic guard to disperse the people were fruitless. Finally a body of mounted gendarmes repeatedly charged the crowd, greatly incensing the demonstrators, who hurled stones and other missiles at the gendarmes who thereupon discharged their revolvers. This also failed to scatter the crowd and the gendarmes finally charged with fixed bayonets and drawn swords. Two gendarmes and several rioters were wounded. Many arrests were made.

A disturbance occurred in the chamber of deputies yesterday when the order of the day of the night was adopted, expressing confidence in the president of the chamber against the vote of the Socialists. The announcement of the vote was the signal for a general uproar, all the deputies rushing to the center of the floor, where a free fight took place. M. Guichenac, Catholic labor member from Ghent, was badly beaten by Socialists. A guard of soldiers on duty finally cleared the galleries and the session later was suspended.

FISCHER AS PEACEMAKER.

Successfully Acts as Mediator Between England and the Transvaal.

PRETORIA, June 29.—The conference between President Kruger and Fischer, a member of the executive council of the Orange Free State, who was the bearer of compromise suggestions from the Free State in the matter of the disputes between the Transvaal and Great Britain, has been concluded. The general impression is that Fischer's mission has been successful. He afterward conferred with Mr. Conyngham Green, the British diplomatic agent here.

LONDON, June 29.—The Johannesburg correspondent of the Standard says: "President Kruger, it is understood here, persists in his demand for arbitration as an essential condition on any settlement. In the meantime the Transvaal continues buying provisions and war material and it has arranged with the Netherlands Railway company to have absolute control of the railway lines in the Orange Free State in case of war."

Reject Canal Articles.

TRENTON, N. J., June 29.—Attorney General Gray filed an opinion with the secretary of state advising the refusal of the articles of incorporation of the American Isthmian Ship Canal company. The articles provided for an authorized capital of \$30,000,000, with the provision that the capital stock might be increased to \$250,000,000 by a vote of the holders of not less than three-fourths of the capital stock. This proviso is in conflict with the New Jersey statute, which gives to the holders of two-thirds of the capital stock the power to increase the authorized capital. The company was intended to be incorporated here to build a ship canal across the Isthmus of Panama.

Iowa Grocers Join to Buy.

DES MOINES, June 29.—The wholesale grocers of Iowa have decided to establish a purchasing agency, which shall buy all the goods handled by the members of this alliance. The purchasing agent will handle yearly something like \$20,000,000. He will be stationed at either New York or Chicago, and by this combination for purchasing purposes the interested houses say that they will be able to save a considerable percentage.

Detail For Dreyfus Court.

RENNES, June 29.—The official list of the composition of the Dreyfus court-martial, which is to assemble in the army service building for the retrial of the prisoner, is as follows: President, Colonel Jouaust; Major Brongniat, artillery; Major de Breen, artillery; Major Proflet, artillery; Major Merle, artillery; Captain Parfait, artillery; Captain Beauvais, artillery. All the members of the court-martial have passed through the polytechnic school.

Deputies Have Situation In Hand.

BRIMMINGHAM, Ala., June 29.—The deputies have the situation in hand at Carlisle and Blossburg, where the bloody race riots occurred Tuesday, although the negro miners refuse to work and continue to carry arms. Sheriff O'Brien says he has no right to disarm them, and with few exceptions they are prepared for any sort of trouble. An additional force of men has been placed on duty for fear of an outbreak.

Rains on Yale Exercises.

NEW HAVEN, June 29.—The annual commencement of Yale university was celebrated yesterday. The weather was decidedly inauspicious, rain beginning to fall just before the time set for the forming of the elaborate procession. The events of the day were the conferring of degrees to the number of 615, the announcement of prizes and the awards of prizes, scholarships and fellowships.

SMALL TRADE IN WHEAT.

Market Is Kept Strong by Crop Damage News—Corn Receipts Are Heavy.

CHICAGO, June 28.—Domestic crop damage reports became the dominant factor in the wheat market today, but trade was small and the market closed at an advance of only 1/2c. Corn declined 1/2c under heavy receipts; oats advanced 1/2c on bullish foreign advices, and provisions advanced 2 1/2c with the advance in hogs. Closing prices: WHEAT—July, 75 1/2; Sept., 74 1/2.
