RESOLUTION
Whereas, a petition has been filed with the county auditor of Haakon county, asking that Township Five (5) North of Range Twenty-two (22) East, in Haakon county, South Dakota, now a part of the school district of which it is now a part; and

Whereas, it appears that said petition is signed by two-thirds of the qualified electors residing in said township, and that the portion of school district number 8 remaining after the creation of the district herein petitioned for will be left with ample school facilities;
Now Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the board of county commissioners of Haakon county and by the county superintendent of said county, that the congressional township numbered five (5) North of Range Twenty-two (22) East, in Haakon county, South Dakota, be declared a separate school district to be known as School District Number 98.
Be It Further Resolved, that the county superintendent make a report to the county commissioners at their next regular meeting in July, showing the property interests and indebtedness of said districts.

Whereas, a petition has been filed with the county auditor of Haakon county, South Dakota, asking that township three (3) north of range twenty-one (21) east, in Haakon county, South Dakota, now a part of the School District Numbered Forty (40) be declared a separate school district, distinct from the school district of which it is now a part; and
Whereas, it appears that said petition is signed by two-thirds of the qualified electors residing in said township and that the portion of school district numbered forty (40) remaining after the creation of the district herein petitioned for will be left with ample school privileges;
Now Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the board of county commissioners of Haakon county and the county superintendent of said county, that the congressional township numbered three (3) north of range twenty-one (21) east, in Haakon county, South Dakota, be established and declared a separate school district to be known as School District Number Ninety-nine (99);
Be It Further Resolved, that the county superintendent make a report to the county commissioners at their next regular meeting showing the property interests and indebtedness of said districts.
