Dedicated Free of Debt

The new Methodist church was dedicated last Sunday. Dr. Samuel B. Kerfoot of Mitchell preached two powerful sermons to large audiences. He is president of the Dakota Wesleyan College, the largest denominational school in the state, having been inaugurated June 10. Dr. Kerfoot stands high among the able churchmen of the state, and is an able speaker.

During the exercises of the day a debt of \$1250 against the building was wiped out so that the property worth \$3200 was dedicated free of debt.

Murderer Captured and Bound Over to Circuit Court

Mike Malone, alias Isaac McCoun, was arrested at Cottonwood last Friday by Marshal Wiltfang of Kadoka charged with the murder mentioned elsewhere in this issue. He was taken to Fort Pierre and has been bound over to await the action of the next term of circuit court which convenes at Fort Pierre the third week in October. McCoun admits the killing but claims that it was done in self defense. Circumstances, however, strongly point to the accused's guilt. Self defense appears a bit flimsy considering the actions of McCoun since the crime was committed.
