SO SAYS THE EDITOR OF THE PRODUCE NEWS.

Natural Causes and Growers Themselves to Blame for Unsatis. factory Conditions.

There has been more or less com plaint recently in the Florida press, Which should know better, that there Is a conspiracy on the part of the fruit daslers in New York and other large markets, to keep down the price of or-
anges. They claim that the rush of inges. They claim that the rush of me season caused buyers early in heavy losses and growers seem to feel hat the present low prices here and n other mairkets are due to the united effort on the part of these, buyers to recoup their losses by forcing the mar kot down to such prices that they will be able to buy the remainder of the crop at
An article bearing on this subject aken from the Florida Agriculturist, printed in another column. It tells plainly how the growers seem to feel bout the matter.
Nothing can be farther from the truth than talk of such a censpiracy. possibility. Anyone who lanows any hing of the New York fruit trude, for
example, knows that it is very hard to get them together in anything, let alone a conspiracy against the Florida orange growers. These growers seem to lose sight of the fuet that the quali y and condition of the Florida oranges which have come out of the State this season. as a general thing, been far rom good. Although promises were made that the fruic yould be better after the first of the year the improve. ment has not been particularly noticeable.
The real truth of cho multer is that the Florida growers have themselves argely to blame for the low prices which their fruit is and h9s been bringing. When the season starte and car after car of green, hali-ripe,
immature fruit was shipped, we tried in every way to conyince the growers in every way to conviace cone growers
that they were acting foolishly; that that they were acting loohishly; that
suels a course in the end would work such a course in the end would woor
against them, but as is usual with cood advice, it was not heeded, Now, what we predicted nas come to pass. After
beiog stung ouce by a green, sour Florida orange, customers are naturaly wary about trying any wore of them no matter how good they may appear The law of supply and demand governs in the orange market the same
as it does in others, Supplies of oranges from all sections have been liberal this season, with all demands more or loss curtailed, due in a grest measure
to the financial stringency. Oranges, with the middle slasses-the great por with the middle slasses--the great por-
ion of the consumers-are more or less of a luxury. When a financial pinch of a luxury. When a financial piach
comes, oranges as well as other fruits, re among the first things cut out. The trade has felt this, receivers on he New York and other great markets
say they have seldom known a time when the orange demand has been so dull. 'Prices of all fruits have suffered and there is no reason why oranges soould be an exception. Conditions are inproving now and better prices the fruit will justify
