NORTH STAR MINING AND DEVELOPMENT CO.

The North Star Mining and Development company, a new incorporation on the well known North Star group of claims, just a mile and a half north west of Oatman, is a sequel to the story of Oatman North Star Mines Co., which had such promise of developing a new mine during Oatman boom of 1915-16, but like so many other gold companies of that time, was smothered by the avalanche of copper and base metal market for six-time needs.

The personnel of the officers and directors of former company ranked high and stock was fully absorbed by many California mining men. Several prominent engineers praised favorably on possibilities of property and its location with proven ore zone of the district. The management never doubted but what they would bring in one any day and played to get results but unexpected high costs consumed the liberal treasury and debt wrote its seal of failure for company.

An incline shaft was sunk in favorable center to allow crosscutting and drifting four ways but objectives

never reached. Through hoping for war contracts and other ventures in lime light, the annual assessment was overlooked for 1920 and property reverted to government. It was relocated by Geo. B. McDevitt and A. C. Parry in 1921. They have done a great deal of surface development and two promising ore shoots are indicated on surface.

The famous old Midnight property that shipped many thousands of dollars of good mill ore to Leland mill, adjoins the North Star group on south west and both properties on same strike and in zone of production.

By letters and suggestions from many of former Oatman North Star stockholders to retrieve their loss in the old company, the new owners have incorporated the group into an assessable stock and all shareholders in the old company will receive share for share in the new company plus a small assessment for new stock. A few cents in an assessable company will go farther than many cents per share straight and here lies secret of Adams and Oatman United companies. They have been able to prove up on their properties and it is especially so in bonanza developments and high stock rise of Oatman United.

The new company has advantage of improvements and much work done by former company and mining can now start almost immediately, only small repairs to road and the many buildings required. It is planned to mine on the surface showings in quartz-calcite vein and to diamond drill at depth the big rhyolite dyke and contact vein.

The officers of new company, are all well versed in mining and prominent in Oatman and know the possibilities of camp and conditions to be met. A. C. Parry is Pres., H. J. Hand, Vice-Pres. and Geo. B. McDevitt, Secretary and their faith and acts will get results on one of the probable new mines of Oatman.

RICH ORE STRUCK ON THE ENTERPRISE

A strike of such importance has been made at Mineral Park this week that many locations have been made in and around it and an undercurrent of excitement made noticeable in the camp. This is the Tarr strike on the Jolly Roger claim. In doing the assessment work John Gross entered the ore at a depth of about 25 feet and the shaft was all in ore at a depth of 30 feet, where work was discontinued on account of the completion of the contract, and also because of encountering water.

Mr. Tarr brought to the Miner office a chunk of the ore that indicates a value of at least 50% copper, being one of the handsomest pieces of copper ore that has come under our observation. Samples taken from the shaft gave results of 43% and 56% copper, with a small amount of silver. The ore is a copper oxide and some carbonates.

The claims of Mr. Tarr lie close in to the Kay property, which has long been considered one of the best groups in the camp. Only a superficial amount of work has been done on it and it is for the first time that entry has been made of an important ore body. This ore body now fills the shaft and the indications are that a wonderful body will be opened with further development. The richness of the ore must surely attract attention

to the property and also to the surrounding territory, which for years has appealed to the mining editor of this journal. So far as developed all the surrounding territory shows copper deposition, but the engineers who have examined it claim that the deposit is not extensive enough to warrant exploration. This may be so, but the fact is that a territory several miles in extent shows the same general character of ore deposition, running from one mile east of Mineral Park to more than one mile west of that place and as far south as Todd Basin.

The territory is peculiarly alike that of the Burro Mountain, New Mexico, where turquoise was mined, then the properties were taken over by the C. & A. company, of Bisbee, and operated for the copper content. The territory at Mineral Park shows beautiful turquoise, but as depth is gained the turquoise gains largely in copper until it is worthless for gem stone. In and around the Kay mines is some exceptionally good ore and the veins appear to be enormous in extent. Only by drilling or the sinking of a deep shaft can the importance of the mines be determined, and it is probable that soon this work will be undertaken.
