**ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION**  
**KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:** That we the undersigned hereby mutually agree to unite and associate ourselves as a corporation under the laws of the State of Arizona and for such purpose we hereby make, execute and adopt the following Articles of Incorporation:

**ARTICLE I.**  
The name of this corporation shall be the Winslow Union Bank & Trust Company.

**ARTICLE II.**  
The period of existence and duration of the life of this corporation shall be twenty-five years, beginning on the date of recording of a certified copy of these Articles of Incorporation with the County Recorder of Navajo County, State of Arizona.

**ARTICLE III.**  
The principal office and place of business of this corporation shall be at Winslow, County of Navajo, State of Arizona, and it may establish offices or branches at such other points within the State of Arizona as may from time to time be designated by the Board of Directors.

**ARTICLE IV.**  
The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by this corporation is, in and by its corporate name, to take, receive, hold, and convey and dispose of any effects and property both real and personal which may be granted, committed, transferred or conveyed to it with its consent, upon any terms or upon any trust or trusts whatsoever, at any time or

times, by any person or persons, including married women, minors, corporations, associations or by any Court of Record. To administer, fulfill and discharge the duties of such trust or trusts for such remuneration as may be agreed upon, to act generally as agents or attorneys for the transaction of business, the management of estates, the collection of rents, interest, dividends, mortgages, bonds, bills, notes and securities for money; to act as agents for the purpose of issuing, negotiating, registering, transferring or countersigning the certificates of stock, bonds, or other obligations of any corporation, association or municipality and to manage any sinking fund thereon on such terms as may be agreed upon; to act as agent for fire insurance, life insurance, surety and other companies and generally to act as agent for any person or corporation in the transaction of any lawful business.

To accept and execute the office of executor, administrator, trustee, receiver or assignee or guardian of any minor, incompetent person, lunatic, or any person subject to guardianship, to loan money upon real estate and collateral security and to execute and issue its notes and debentures payable at a future date, and to pledge its mortgages on real estate and other securities therefor, to take and receive from any person or persons, associations or corporations on deposit for safe keeping and storage, gold and silver plate, jewelry, money, stocks, documents, securities and other valuable and personal property and to rent out the use of safes and other receptacles upon such terms and for such compensation as may be agreed upon. To become surety for administrators, guardians or other trustee or persons in cases where one or more securities are required. To examine titles, to make and certify abstracts of title, to guarantee or insure to grantees the validity of titles in real estate transfers at a rate of compensation and upon such terms as may be agreed upon. To lease, hold and convey all such lands and personal estate as may be necessary to carry on its business as well as such real and personal estate as it may deem necessary to acquire to enforce settlement of any claims or demands arising out of its business transactions and to issue and execute in the transaction of its business all necessary receipts, certificates and contracts which shall be signed by such persons as may be designated by the laws of the corporation. To do any and all acts and things pertaining to

or that may be connected with the purpose and objects above specified, or that may be necessary or convenient or useful to the main purpose of the corporation in carrying on a general banking business.

**ARTICLE V.**  
The amount of authorized capital stock of this corporation is Fifty Thousand Dollars divided into Five Hundred shares of One Hundred Dollars each, of which Two Hundred Fifty shares shall be paid in in cash, real estate fixtures or liquid securities approved by the Board of Directors, at not less than par value. The remaining Two Hundred Fifty shares shall remain as treasury stock and be issued only by the consent of two thirds of the stockholders of record, and when so issued shall be paid for in cash at not less than one hundred ten dollars per share, and when so issued the stock of the corporation shall be fully paid and non-assessable.

**ARTICLE VI.**  
The management and control of the business and property of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors consisting of not less than three nor more than seven members who shall be elected from the stockholders of record at the annual meeting which shall be held on the first Saturday of January each year and said directors shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified: any vacancy that may occur in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining members of said Board from the stockholders of record, said Board of Directors shall have power to enact by-laws and make any and all rules necessary for the conduct and management of the affairs of the corporation not inconsistent with the law or these Articles of Incorporation.

**ARTICLE VII.**  
The names and residence of the persons who have been selected as officers and Board of Directors to manage the business and affairs of the Corporation until the first annual stockholders meeting are as follows:  
J. H. FULLER, President and Director, San Diego, Cal.; O. B. SUTTON, Vice-President and Director, Phoenix, Ariz.; R. C. KAUFFMAN, Cashier and Director, Winslow, Ariz.; J. B. HERNDON, Director, Albuquerque, N. M.; J. L. SWEENEY, Director, Winslow, Ariz.; J. H. GIBSON, Director, Winslow, Ariz.

**ARTICLE VIII.**  
The greatest amount of indebtedness to which the corporation may subject itself shall not exceed an amount equal to two thirds of the capital stock actually issued and paid in.

**ARTICLE IX.**  
The private property of the stock holders of this corporation shall not be subject to the payment of the corporate debts in any amount or to any extent whatever.

**ARTICLE X.**  
These articles may be changed, altered or amended at any authorized meeting of the stockholders by a vote of the stockholders representing a majority of the stock.

**ARTICLE XI.**  
The name and place of residence of the Statutory Agent of this corporation shall be R. C. Kaufman, Winslow, Navajo County, State of Arizona, who has been a bona fide resident of said state for more than three years, and who, for and in behalf of said corporation, shall accept and acknowledge service of and upon whom may be served all necessary processes in any action, suit or proceedings that may be had or brought against the corporation in any of the courts of the State of Arizona, such service or processes or notice of the acceptance hereof by said agent endorsed thereon to have the same force and effect as if served upon the President or Secretary of said Corporation.

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canyon a distance of slightly over having switchback after switchback; one-half mile. The trails are tortuous and in many places grades exceed 40 per cent.

In designing the bridge it was necessary to secure a structure which would be light and at the same time have sufficient strength to accommodate the travel and to have the units of such size or weight that they could be packed by mules down the trail. The main cables are to be of special tramway plow steel, each weighing between 700 and 800 pounds, requiring four mules to transport it. It is planned to divide the cable into four pairs of coils, one pair being placed on each mule with an intervening length of cable of about 20 or 30 feet. Each mule will be in charge of a packer, and the intermediate men will, in addition to leading the mules, control the slack of 20 or 30 feet of cable so that they can successfully negotiate the switchbacks.

The floor system of the bridge will be suspended from the main cables by special 3-8 inch steel wire ropes, placed every six feet apart, which at attached to the floor beams by 3-8 inch steel stirrup rods every three feet apart. The hanger cables will be packed in small coils and the stirrup rods will be folded on themselves so that they will be of sufficient length to permit packing. The floor system will be cut into pieces not more than 9 feet long in order that they can be readily packed, but

even timber of this length will make it difficult and interesting work for the men in charge of the pack mules to successfully guide them down the trails.

The bridge will be five feet wide with guard rails of heavy mesh wire and because of the wind play and vibration which may be expected in a bridge of this length impounding gates will be placed at each end so that only one mule or horse will be permitted to cross at a time. It may be necessary at first to blindfold the animals, but after they have made the trip once or twice they will become accustomed and will not hesitate to cross. The bridge will cost in the neighborhood of \$13,000 and contracts have already been entered into for its construction and it is expected that tourists may be permitted to cross before the close of the 1921 summer season. Two additional bridges are planned at different points on the Colorado within the national park area, which are component parts in the ultimate development of north rim travel.
