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**TRADE AT HOME.**

MONDAY, March 16, will witness the opening of the fourth annual "Trade at Home - Use Arizona Products" Week held in Arizona—the fourth concerted effort on the part of civic organizations of the state to keep Arizona money in Arizona, where it will develop the state's industry and resources and do its bit for the prosperity of every citizen.

Practically every city in the state will join in the observance of the week through its chamber of commerce, in every case the campaign being "Buy in Your Home Town," with the added "Use Arizona Products" slogan for the state as a whole. And as a sequel to the various local movements, purchasing agents, wholesale dealers, farm organization representatives and manufacturers will meet in a buyers' and sellers' conference in Phoenix March 18 to get together to improve the preparation and distribution and promote the consumption of the state's varied products.

Throughout the week it will be stressed everywhere that trading at home will result in actual benefit to the individual purchaser; that it is a matter of individual advantage as much as civic patriotism. There is real proof for this view, too.

The sole result of trading at home is the creation of more business, and a more permanent prosperity. But what are the results of developing the business of your community?

One result is the growth of present business and the establishment of new ones. This means employment of more people, and room for new residents. It also means there will be more taxable property and more people to pay for public improvements; schools, roads, parks, paved streets, etc.

Another result is that increased volume of business may well mean lower prices, by reducing the proportionate overhead. Add to that the more efficient service it will be possible to give, and the larger stocks which may be carried.

All these items apply with equal force to the use of Arizona products to build up the business of the entire state, with resultant additional employment, greater taxable

property. "Trade at Home—Use Arizona Products," is merely another way of saying "Make Prosperity." And somehow everybody has more money when times are prosperous.

**ST. PATRICK'S DAY.**

MARCH 17, next Tuesday, will be observed, especially by the Irish, as St. Patrick's Day.

St. Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. He lived about 396-469. His name is Latin, signifying patrician. According to one tradition, he was born near the present town of Dumbarton, Scotland, where his father was evidently a man of some standing, a deacon in the Roman garrison. Patrick was captured by a marauding expedition of Irish Picts and sold into slavery in Ireland. Here he led a hard life, but succeeded after a time in escaping. He then, according to the popular account, fitted himself for the priesthood in France and Rome, where he obtained permission from Pope Celestine to return to Ireland to convert the natives to Christianity. He left two pieces of writing; one, a so-called "Confession," is a defense of his work in Ireland and is in a way autobiographical. In reality, beyond the fact that he was one of the earliest, if not the first priest to preach Christianity to the Irish, little is known regarding the details of his life.

The popular saying that St. Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland is peculiar, as snakes never existed in that island. All accounts seem to imply that St. Patrick was not an Irishman at all, but a man of Roman ancestry, born in Scotland—a Christian missionary to the Irish.

**THE TRAINING CAMP.**

THE recruiting campaign for Citizens' Military Training camps is now open. These camps are for thirty days and begin July 28. The young men from the states of Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, which comprise the Eighth Corps area, will be trained in six camps located at Fort Sam Houston, Texas; Fort Crockett, Texas; Fort Bliss, Texas; Fort Sill, Oklahoma; Fort Logan, Colorado, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona. The transportation of each man who is accepted is paid by the government from his home to the nearest camp. At camp, clothing, food and quarters are provided, also without cost to the applicant. When camp is over, free transportation is furnished for the journey home. The government pays all bills.

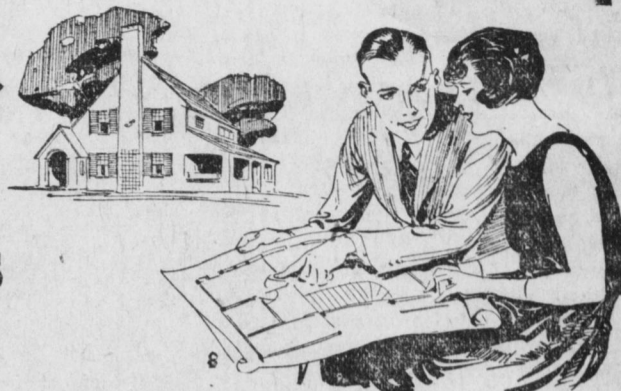
**Operetta by Students Before State Meeting**
