June Receipts of Kerby's Office Total \$93,010.57

Receipts for the office of the secretary of state for the month of June totaled \$93,010.57, according to a statement issued by James H. Kerby, secretary of state.

The report shows that \$18,952.50 of the amount was fees from motor vehicle licenses; \$72,775.13 was gasoline tax collections, and \$282.94

was miscellaneous fees. Of the gasoline tax collected, \$36,887.57 was remitted direct to the counties from which it was collected, while a like amount was remitted to the state treasurer to be divided between the 75 per cent funds of the counties and the state's 25 per cent.

About 110 cars of cantaloupes passed through Winslow Monday, marking the first big shipment of the second crop. Ninety-four cars passed through Sunday.

It is expected that 110 to 125 cars a day will be shipped this way all this week.
